## From The Rabbi's Desk

And The Lord said to the prophet Ezekiel: "I shall pass over you, and I shall see you rooted in your blood; and I shall say: In your blood shall you live..."

My brother is dead; he was your brother too. He died defending the Golan; he died on Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the Jewish calendar, the Day of Forgiveness; he died so that his people could live; he died so that we could live. "In your blood shall you live..."

My brother was young, barely twenty-two. He was infected with the superficial bravado which fills so many of his nation, a bravado born of the necessity to be confident when one feels oneself surrounded by blood-thirsty aggressors, a bravado which attemps to defy a United Nations which awards a standing ovation to a Russian Delegation walk-out in the midst of an Israeli statement, a bravado emanating from the fact that Israel will live because Israel must live. Were it not for Israels' bravado a cruel and silent world would let it die even as they let him die — my brother and your brother — who is dead in the Golan.

"In your blood shall you live ..."

My brother was six feet in height, blonde and clear-eyed, but he was slightly stooped despite his youth. His bent shoulders seemed to be carrying a burden — the burden of privileges and responsibility of three-thousand years. With him walked all of Jewish History — Moses, as he breathed his last, looking lovingly upon the land he could not enter but without which his people could not endure.

R. Akiba, as he whispered the *Shma* in the face of Roman torture, bearing testimony to an unconquerable faith in Jerusalem restored, in Israel redeemed.

Six-million souls who lost their lives because they committed the crime of having been born into the chosen People chosen to live, chosen to love, chosen to die...

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## EHOD

On the editorial side, Pearl Kaplan is our first Assistant to the Editor. Both Mr. and Mrs. Harold Kaplan are veterans of synagogue activity. It goes without saying that there could be no Bulletin without Martha Cohn. For the record, though, bulletin errors are ours, not Mrs. Cohn's or the Rabbi's. Ehod recalls the very first midrash Rabbi Riskin related to the fledgling congregation of Lincoln Square. The story suggests an origin for the Shma: When Jacob's health was failing, and he knew that he would die shortly, he summoned together all his sons. Yet, as they gathered before Jacob, they were unrecognizable to him. The sons were clean-shaven; they wore Egyptian garb. In sum, they were strangers.

The sons sensed their father's unease. Desperately they wanted to convey to Jacob before his death that, despite the seeming difference between their attire and his, despite the seeming difference between their values, their beliefs, their aspirations and his, actually their values, beliefs and aspirations were one and the same. The sons wanted to convey their identity with the sons Jacob knew when together they entered Egypt 17 years before.

So in one voice they proclaimed: "Shma Yisroel, hear O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is One." Hear, O Jacob our father, your God and our God is one and the same God.

And Jacob understood. Just as he expired, he murmured back, "Blessed be His Glorious Kingdom Forever and Ever."

The goal of oneness has guided the congregation through it formative years. This theme underlies the Melanie Ross Youth Center, the Drop-in Center, and all our Out-Reach and In-Reach programs - in short, the heart of the Synagogue.

The "divine challenge" of Lincoln Square is to forge one vibrant, caring, all-inclusive community. The bulletin is entitled Ehod to serve as a monthly reminder of that goal.

### Miracle or Hurricane?

For the general newcomer to the "Miracle of the West Side," Lincoln Square Synagogue is impressive. But for a freshman administrator at the synagogue, Lincoln Square is more of a hurricane. The pace of activities is frantic and furious and the growth from day to day can be seen and felt. Confusion and crises, emergency campaigns and appeals are taken in stride and are considered rather normal.

Through all this, the Joseph Shapiro Academy opened with a record enrollment, a host of new course offerings and a supplementary experiential-oriented program. While Rabbi Riskin's classes remain the main attractions, other course offerings have come into their own and now boast devoted followings and substantial enrollments. For the first time, the Shapiro Academy has accepted students for a teacher's degree program.

### MELANIE ROSS YOUTH CENTER

The most impressive success record however, belongs to the Melanie Ross Youth Center. Under the leadership of Mordecai Reich, the Melanie Ross Youth program began the year from scratch (a few telephone numbers and addresses) and has, in a matter of 31/2 weeks, developed an enthusiastic following of close to 50 teenagers. The program features weekly Sunday night meetings, with guest performers and entertainment, and was recently highlighted by a free Sukkah dinner with Rabbi Riskin as the guest speaker. In the offing for the future: Emergency "Help Israel" programs, a Shabbat Retreat in the country, special week long seminars, entertainment specials, unusual trips, a regular Shabbat program, etc.

As part of the program of the Melanie Ross Youth program, a drive to "reach out" to unaffiliated local youth has met with a good measure of success. Some of the individual case histories are moving and inspiring and I hope to be able to share them at an appropriate time.

To all this can be added the Sukkah Mobile, the Lincoln Towers "reach out" program, the Lincoln Square Torah Van, the local High School lecture program, the Drop-in Center, the Beit Cafe, the Basic Judaism-publications project, and more. It is not difficult to conclude that the Lincoln Square "Hurricane-Miracle" shows no signs of abating. We can be particularly proud of the synagogue's trailblazing efforts to reach Jews of all affiliations and backgrounds by undertaking model projects and programs that, we hope, will eventually become a standard part of the Jewish community.

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From the driver's seat of the Lincoln Square Synagogue Succah mobile during Hol hamoed Succot, traffic in Manhattan was heavy and available parking spaces were scarce, as usual. As soon as a parking space was found, Succah mobile volunteers disembarked from the truck. clutching in their hands the four species associated with Succot. While some volunteers set up literature and refreshment tables, others positioned themselves on street corners actively encouraging Jews to bentch etrog and inviting passers-by to visit our decorated Succah. Succah mobile aides discussed the holiday with interested and curious New Yorkers.

Most passers-by and guests in the Succah responded favorably to the idea of the Succah mobile. Some passers-by criticized the volunteers for performing an insignificant service at the same time that Israelis were fighting a war. Volunteers explained the importance of mitzvot, davka during a war. Approximately 300-500 people visited, and/or bentched in the Succah mobile.

Often a person did not know the blessings associated with the mitzvah of Succot. Aides prepared transliterated copies of the blessings. Children and the elderly especially appreciated the volunteers' efforts to explain the blessings, the holiday, and the Succah mobile's purpose.

The Succah mobile visited the City Hall Rally on October 14th. Other visiting stops during Hol-hamoed included: The Park Crescent Nursing Home. Two volunteers stepped aboard a bus filled with passengers visiting L.S.S. and helped everyone on the bus fulfill the mitzvah of lulav and etrog. One passerby asked a volunteer to accompany her to the Chess House on 72nd Street. Upon being informed of the Succot Holiday, players interrupted their games and made the blessing for lulav.

G-d willing next year the Succah mobile will again appear on the streets of New York. Thanks (("שכ")) to the Fluk family for building the Succah. Thanks to each volunteer who participated.

## Inside Out/Will The Vice-President Resign?

The question seems to be on the tip of every tongue. From the Feldman Nursery School to the Joseph Shapiro Academy classes, in the Sisterhood and in the Men's Club, everyone discusses and debates the burning issue—will the Vice President resign? Will Vice President Maurice Spanbock resign?

The problem, of course, is unprecedented in Lincoln Square history. The ramifications are extraordinary.

Apparently, the fifteen families who founded the Synagogue never contemplated the contingency. Our Constitution provides only:

In the event the Vice-President is booted out or resigns, the Eleventh Vice-President shall succeed him. L.S.S. Constitution, Article 7, Para. 1.

This manner of succession presents a myriad of difficulties, not the least of which is that we do not have an Eleventh Vice-President.

An alternative possibility lies in Article 11, Section 2, Para. 3, "Powers of the President":

The President may appoint anybody to any position so long as Mrs. Cohn thinks it's O.K.

(This is also known as the "advice and Cohnsent" provision.)

All sorts of pressures are being exerted on Arthur Morgenstern in the event replacement becomes necessary. The Bachs are pushing for one of their own, while the Sisterhood is urging a woman Vice-President. Marion Spanbock is prominently mentioned by the Young Couples, while the favorite of the Men's Club is Spiro Agnew.

Another possibility, although this seems remote, would be the election of a black. As there is only one black in the Synagogue, the choice necessarily narrows down to Leroy, the Handyman. There has also been some talk of recalling Rabbi Yitzhak Abramson from Saratoga since he portrayed a handyman last Purim, but as this could be considered tokenism, the possibility has been soft-pedalled — although most people feel Rabbi Abramson should be brought back regardless.

A general consensus seems to be forming that any replacement should be a bland person about whom all the elements of the congregation could unite. This is an exceedingly difficult task since no one in our community is bland.

Hopefully the eventuality will not arise. The question has only been raised by the seeming riff growing between Arthur Morgenstern and Maurice Spanbock. This is proved by the fact that every Shabbat Mr. Morgenstern and Mr. Spanbock parade after the Rabbi and Cantor, shaking hands with everyone in the front row, when the Torah is taken out...But, have you ever seen them shake hands with one another????

Anyway, Mr. Spanbock is one of the hardest working vice-presidents in Lincoln Square's history. His take-home legal work from the Synagogue is frequently as time-consuming as his office work.

We really could not do better...unless maybe we got that Young Couples choice mentioned above.
