## From The Rabbi's Desk

In an article printed in The New York Times of September 12, 1973 dealing with the orthodox reaction to the Conservative vote to include women in the minyan (necessary quorum to enable public prayer) the characterization expressed was that "orthodoxy demands a strict observance of Jewish law governing daily religious and ethical conduct. Conservative Judaism, while adhering to religious laws, allows for reinterpretation in accordance with present day situations." This description is a totally inaccurate one. Traditional orthodox Jewish law has constantly allowed for reinterpretation in accordance with present day situations. The great religiolegal authorities of every generation publish responsa which seek to apply the Talmudic principles to modern problems and discoveries. To cite merely one example, Rav. Moshe Feinstein, a contemporary halakhic authority, has published responsa which deal with such manifold issues as artificial insemination, organ transplant, oral contraception and conscientious objection.

The recent decision of the Conservative Movement regarding women's inclusion in a minyan is not a reinterpretation of law; it is an utter disregard of law. Basic to the traditional legal structure is the notion that every privilege must bring concomitant responsibility. Since Jewish law respects and encourages the right of women to bear children and maintain a household, Jewish law frees women from the necessity of public prayer thrice daily. This does not exclude women from the option of regular participation in public services. It merely removes from them an obligation of Synagogue attendance. And

since women are not required to comprise a quorum for daily public prayer, they are not included in the count of a required quorum for Jewish public worship.

Moreover, it can hardly be denied that it is Jewish law which provides the continuity of the Jewish people and that it is Jewish law which maintained the boundaries of Israel during our twothousand years of stateless diaspora. A problem within the law was always discussed with utmost seriousness by recognized Talmudic scholars who utilized the forum of respected halakhic publications for their considered judgments. A question of consequence was never decided by majority opinion or committee vote just as a matter of constitutional interpretation would never be voted upon in a general election or by a committee of standards. Since the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Conservative Movement saw fit to render its majority decision through the New York Times, I can only conclude that this matter is to be taken with the seriousness its publicity warrants.

Chanukah — latkes, dreidels, nuts. ; \_ you win half, 7 \_ you lose ... menorah with a shamas ... A little girl sits in a classroom in the Middle West. The bulletin boards are decorated with Christmas scenes. "Young lady, I know that you are Jewish. You don't celebrate Christmas. Tell the class about your holiday."

Chanukah — נס גדול היה שם a great miracle happened there. A great miracle occurred when the oil lasted for eight days instead of one. A great miracle happened when a small group of people who were led by a man of faith, Judah Maccabee, stood up for their faith. The Temple was desecrated by the Hellenists. Judah Maccabee, against tremendous odds, defeated them.

Chanukah, however, is not a major holiday, but a minor one. Because many Jewish families do not understand their heritage they have elevated Chanukah to the importance of Christmas. The Sabbath, the High Holy Days, Passover, are all of greater significance than Chanukah. Yet how many people involve themselves in these aspects of Jewish life? If one Sabbath were observed by a family, they would not need to give eight lavish presents for the days of the holiday. Rather, they would appreciate the simpler pleasures of Chanukah — latkes, dreidels, menorah with a shamas.

### **New Projects**

In the next few weeks, you will be hearing about a number of new and interesting activities being inaugurated. Some of these will have already taken place by the time of this reading. Due to the wide variety of projects, everyone should be able to find something to suit his or her individual interest, or know of someone who could benefit.

Beginning Monday, November 26, 1973, at 8:30 P.M., Mr. Tuvya Rome will be conducting a series of three seminars on Mideast Realities. On Sunday, December 2, at 5:00 P.M., Professor Michael Wyschograd, of the Department of Philosophy of Baruch College, will begin a special course to combat the threat of Jewish conversion to Christianity. December 7 and 8 are the dates of the Joseph Shapiro Academy Shabbaton for students who would like to learn more about Shabbat and Jewish observance.

The Melanie Ross Youth Center will continue its full schedule of activities during the month of December. Last month, youth group members saw a full length Israeli film, wrote letters to Israeli soldiers, had a Shabbat luncheon at the Synagogue with youth members of the Great Neck Synagogue, attended the Hineni rally at Madison Square Garden and spent Shabbat at the NCSY Shabbaton in Astoria. The Drop-in-Center and the lending librory have been revitalized under the leadership of Yitzchak Rosen, and meets on Sundays from 1-5 P.M.

The Melanie Ross Youth Center, along with the Jewish Center and other local synagogues, will sponsor the first Jewish Coffee House on Saturday Evening, December 8, at 8:30 P.M. at the Jewish Center. The program will feature the Messenger's Orchestra and Singers, and is open to all Jewish High School students. In addition to the regular Sunday night meetings, the Melanie Ross Youth Program for December will be capped by Yeshiva University's Torah Leadership Seminar at the Lido Beach Hotel, December 21-26.

This month will also mark a first attempt at organizing a Lincoln Towers Reach-Out Program. At a date to be announced, Jewish residents of 150 West End Avenue will be invited to the Synagogue for an informal meeting with Rabbi Riskin. The occasion will be an attempt to develop a feeling of concern among the Jewish people of the neighborhood, and to help them learn more about our common feelings and responsibilities.

December is also the month that the Torah Van is expected to make its debut in the Lincoln Square vicinity, about which you will surely hear more in the future. All in all, it looks like an exciting month in the offing.

### In the Community

#### Hakarat Toda has arrived:

Our Visiting the Elderly group's November meeting was a most memorable one for the participants, a tribute to the group's members and Gail Aranoff's leadership, and an inkling of the constructive effect Lincoln Square can. should, and must have, in the community.

As usual, just recently-joined members related their initial encounters with the elderly persons they have been assigned to visit. Meetings commence in this fashion for three reasons. First, these novice visitors receive comments from our members who truly may be called "veterans" now, and also from our professional social workers. Second, potential new visitors who are attending their first meeting are made cognizant of possible early pitfalls. Finally, the group's procedure is constantly revised in the light of new experiences. For example, after Tuvya Rome noted that his initial visit was eased by a more formal introduction to his new "friend" (to use the word we perfer to the social worker's sterile term "patient"), we agreed to institute a formal introduction for every future initial contact.

Also, as usual, long-time visitors recounted certain problems which cropped up during their visits. This meeting was so special though because of the feedback from our in-house social worker. Perla Weinstock. She offered two touching stories about the persons we have been visiting: Our member, our mostesteemed member, Mrs. Fanny Schulz, has been visiting a woman who had lost her desire to live. By her visits. Mrs. 

Schulz has turned this around. Her friend has become one of the happiest and well-adjusted persons in the Nursing Home. Perhaps only a participant in this project can appreciate the deep satisfaction we felt at this news. The second bit of good news involved Erica Reingevirtz's friend. A founding member of Hakarat Toda, Erica has been visiting, since the group's inception, the one totally bed-ridden person with whom we have had contact. Yet that is now past tense. Erica's visitee has recovered and will shortly be leaving the home. Perla conjectured that the nexus between Erica's visits and her friend's recovery was something less than direct, but those who know Erica agree that everyone in her presence becomes re-invigorated.

The group is also very proud to welcome new members - Debby Abelow, Ed Lifton, Tuvya Rome and Richard and Rita Rothenberg. We find the first and last names particularly significant additions and these new visitors especially deserving of praise since they are what we hope will be the vanguard of Young Couples representation in Hakarat Toda. Until this time, participation has come almost exclusively from the Bach group.

Shabbat afternoon groups for children ages 5-12 are being formed at the Synagogue under Junior League auspices. The children will be divided by age and activity, and will be supervised by qualified group leaders. Interested parents are asked to contact the office.

### Kindling the Chanukah Menorah

In thanksgiving and commemoration, we kindle one candle on the first night of Chanukah (Wednesday Evening, December 19) and add a candle each night until we have eight lit candles on the last night of the holiday. The candles are placed in the Menorah from the left and are kindled from left to right. The count does not include the shamas, the candle which lights the others.

It is preferable to place the Menorah on the window-sill in order to "publicize the miracle." One should endeavor to kindle the Chanukah lights at the time of the coming out of the stars, but many still kindle them as long as there are people walking in the street or awake in the household. On Friday evening, however, one must kindle the Chanukah lights before the Sabbath candles, and should use candles which are large enough to burn for thirty minutes after the coming out of the stars.
