

FROM THE RABBI'S CABIN

G-d does not go on vacation. . . Business people go on vacation. Doctors and lawyers go on vacation. Even Rabbis and Cantors go on vacation. Mothers hardly ever are on vacation--but some vacations they take!

But G-d does not go on vacation at all. Neither He nor His Torah fade out of the scene, out of contact. It is important to remember that as we make the transition into summer spirit.

Whatever our plans are, it is vital to recall that Torah's demands on us are not lessened during July and August. Standards of t'zniut (modesty) are not decreased due to the heat. Expectations as to frequency and times of prayer are not modified by travel plans. The human mind is a delicate instrument, and it begins to atrophy very rapidly when its synapses are not used; Jewish intellectual exercise is as essential during the summer as it is during the other ten months of the year.

Incidentally, if you are looking for some fascinating and challenging Jewish reading for the summer, I would recommend any one of three recent books which have begun to chart a new area of application of halacha--of business practice and ethics. The books are:

1. "Free Enterprise and Jewish Law" by Rabbi Dr. Aaron Levine of Yeshiva University (Ktav, 1980), and its sequel,

2. "Economics and Jewish Law" by the same author (Ktav, 1987).

These two books constitute a fascinating beginning to what will certainly become an increasingly important area of halachic study.

3. "With All Your Possessions" by Dr. Meir Tamari of Bar Ilan University (Free Press, 1987), subtitled "Jewish Ethics and Economic Life", covers much of the same material as Dr. Levine's book but makes its own distinct contribution to the literature of business ethics.

To return to my theme, the Jewishness of our lives should not be permitted to decline during the summer. While withdrawal for regeneration may be necessary, let us make the withdrawal from the material, not the spiritual, side of our existence.

Both of them are stepping down after serving as officers of the congregation for a number of years in order to allow other people to have the privilege of serving on our Executive While I shall miss their Committee. intelligence, experience, deep concern and outright love for our congregation at the officers' meetings, I am consoled by the fact that we will continue to benefit from their leadership in other ways. move to each other with joy in every step. In this case, the two women said each others' names and embraced as if it had been years. They were leaning against the back wall, talking words I could not hear but expressing feelings I could understand.

A hub-bub in the auditorium began as the lights in the big room were going off, then on, then off. The rabbi continued to talk about the meaninglessness of women's prayer groups. An officer of the synagogue then walked to the back of the room and pointed to the women still aglow with their meeting. "Could you move away from there? You're on the light switch." The women moved away and continued their animated conversation. The lights came on and the rabbi continued to say what he had been saying all along. It occurred to me that the sincere desire of women to express themselves in a way that is meaningful to them and appropriate to the tradition they've embraced will be like a groundswell that can't be stopped. . .as opposition slowly fades into darkness.
