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# The Story of Passover

Passover begins at sundown of the fourteenth of the month of Nissan, and lasts eight days, of which the first two days and the last two are complete holidays, while the intervening four days are "Chol homoed"-half holidays.

The holiday commemorates the freedom of the children of Israel from the bondage of Egypt. Under the leadership of Moses, the Israelites departed from Egypt, after ten severe plagues had been visited upon the inhabitants of the land.

The Bible says (Exodus, Chapter 13), "Remember this day, on which you came out of Egypt, out of the house of bondage . . . Unleavened bread shall be eaten throughout the seven days, and there shall be seen no leavened bread with thee, in all thy borders."

Since on Passover we are not allowed to have in our food any trace of leavened bread, the dishes and utensils used on Passover must be such that were either not used at all during the year, or at least cleansed from any absorption of "chometz" in the manner prescribed by the law.

"Biur chometz" means the removal of all leavened bread. This is started by pious Jewish women many days before Passover. (Chometz that cannot be destroyed before Passover is sold by the Rabbi to a non-Jew, and every head of a family has to delegate that task to him several days in advance). The official search for leavened bread takes place on the evening before the holiday. On the eve of Passover we are permitted to eat chometz only until the passing of the first third of the day.

Passover is called "Z'man Cherusenu," the Time of Our Freedom. It is remarkable that the freeing of the People of Israel coincided with the freeing of nature from its winter stagnation.

Since the only kind of bread we are permitted to eat on Passover is what is known as "matzoth," the holiday is called "Chag Hamatzoth," or the 'Feast of Matzoth." The prohibition against eating leavened bread on Passover is due to an important incident that accompanied the deliverance of the Israelites from the land of bondage. (Continued Next Week)


**A** MAN came to call on Rabbi B. "Rabbi," said he, "I have a Shelah to ask. May one satisfy the required cups (of wine) with milk?"
