### 50 Students Set As Goal For Fall Registration

Coincident with the beginning of the new semester, the Talmud Torah will open an intensive registration campaign this Sunday, October 16, according to Rabbi Philip Goodman, Principal. Extending over a period of three weeks, the registration campaign will feature many special events. Bulletins will be issued to pupils daily, urging them to bring all their friends to the Talmud Torah.

Campaign devices depicting the progress made will be posted in conspicuous places throughout the building. Weekly assemblies will be held to which prospective pupils will be invited. Every pupil that enrolls another will receive a beautiful prize.

Classes are fully organized at the present time and a modern curriculum of study is being pursued under the guidance of capable and thoroughly-trained teachers. Among the extra-curricula activities in which the children are invited to participate are arts and crafts, dramatics, singing and journalism, as well as regular athletic periods.



Bamberger became a Rabbi when he was twenty years old. He did not plan to make a living as a Rabbi, however, and he opened a general store in his native town. His love for learning outbalanced his commercial enterprise even in these surroundings, and he continued his studies in his store. He became exceedingly angry when customers venture.
