JEWISH ODDITIES

Jehuda Cresques flourished at Majorca and Barcelona at the end of the fourteenth century. He was so well known for his abilities in map making, as well as for his knowledge of the then-known world, that his work was sought after by the most powerful figures of his day. The maps used by Columbus were drawn by him. Prince Juan of Aragon sent to Charles VI of France in 1381, when the latter was a lad of thirteen years, a "mappa mundi" made by Cresques. It has been suggested that this is the wellknown Catalan map now in the Louvre, which marks an epoch

in the history of map-making, as the recent discoveries of Marco Polo were added to the usual information contained have remained in Majorca for a considin the "portulani" or sea-charts of the erable time and to have become known Mediterranean mariners.
