## .. At the Fair

More than 800 clergymen representing the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish faiths unanimously approved a suggestion of Mayor F. H. LaGuardia at a luncheon called by him last week to set aside Saturday and Sunday, February 18 and 19, as Temple of Religion Days throughout the churches and synagogues of the metropolitan area.

Acting upon the Mayor's recommendation, the rabbis, ministers and priests agreed to request the members of their respective parishes and congregations to make contributions to the Temple of Religion Campaign Fund at all services on those two days.

#### Campaign in Final Stage

The Temple of Religion campaign, in which Mayor LaGuardia has taken a leading part, is now entering its final stage with total subscriptions of \$182,000 reported toward the fund of \$250,000 needed to build, equip and maintain the Temple. Included in the total amount subscribed, it has been announced, are gifts of \$25,000 from John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and \$20,000 from Edward S. Harkness.

Although the directors of the Temple have secured sufficient funds to provide for the construction of the building itself, it is necessary to complete the total fund needed, it is announced, to make possible the maintenance of a continuous series of programs at the Temple during the operation of the Fair.

#### Programs Planned

The programs will include convocations and meetings, music, pageants and drama. Various committees of clergymen and laymen representing the three faiths are now being organized to assist the Temple directors in planning and supervising the program of activities.

In connection with the program of music which is being planned, it is announced, a \$25,000 concert organ of "classical" construction has been given to the Temple of Religion for use during the Fair by John W. Haussermann, Jr., American composer.

#### Refugee Scholars To Conduct Crime Survey

What the Institute of Criminal Science believes to be the first thorough attempt at a scientific study of the causes of crime in this country will become possible because seven world leaders in this field are now available among German refugees. Efforts are now being made to complete negotiations for their employment and the issuance of visas. The study will afford employment to many other trained research workers, American and refugee. The plan is to utilize the findings of the study in a wide program of crime prevention through public educational work.

# George Washington And The Jew

When the Revolutionary War ended the number of inhabitants residing in the colonies was 3,000,000. The number of Jews has been variously estimated at less than 3,000. Regardless of their number, history tells us that most of them were devoted to the patriot cause.

From a military standpoint, the best known is Colonel Isaac Franks who made an exceptional record not only as aide-de-camp to Washington but as a powerful influence in encouraging the colonists when their morale was low. That his relationship to Washington was close, has always been admitted. This is confirmed by the fact that when yellow fever was prevalent in Philadelphia, Washington became Franks' guest at his home and remained there until it had abated.

Washington, Madison and Morris, amongst others active in behalf of the patriots, were familiar and knew of their own knowledge of the \$300,000 contributed by Hyam Salomon to the cause of independence. Conditions at Valley Forge were such that had Hyam Salomon been unable to raise the money the patriots might have been doomed to failure. Washington knew that no repayment had been made to Salomon, when in response to the letter (printed below) of Moses Seixas, Warden of the Newport Hebrew Congregation of Newport, Rhode Island, dated August 17th, 1790, he replied in part as follows:

May the Children of the Stock of Abraham, who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other inhabitants, while everyone shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree, and there shall be none to make him afraid. May the Father of all mercies scatter light and not darkness in our paths, and make us all in our several useful vocations here and in his own due time and way, everlastingly happy.

We know that at the time of Washington's inauguration on April 30th, 1789, there were six Jewish congregations in the United States, being located in Savannah, New York, Philadelphia, Newport, Richmond, and Charleston. The congregation at Newport and that of Savannah wrote separate letters. The four congregations of the other cities above referred to, wrote a joint letter. Washington's reply opened with the following sentence:

"The liberality of sentiment towards each which marks every political and religious denomination of men in this country stands unparalleled in the history of nations."

Within less than a month after Washington was inaugurated he said that "It shall be my endeavor to contribute whatever may be in my power towards the preservation of the civil and religious liberties of the American people."

Thus Washington, our First American, stood for those ideals and principles, which have ever been the basis of the life of the Jew. The spirit of tolerance preached by Washington will always remain with all intelligent Americans, the same way as it has been part of the very existence of the Jew. Hence it is the paramount duty of the Jew to observe the birthdays of men like Washington, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt, who typified the love of God and country.

# A Letter To Washington

SIR.

Permit the Children of the Stock of Abraham to approach you with the most cordial affection and esteem for your person and merits, and to join with your fellow citizens in welcoming you to Newport.

Deprived as we heretofore have been of the invaluable rights of free citizens, we now (with a deep sense of gratitude to the Almighty Disposer of all events) behold a Government erected by the Majesty of the people—a Government which to bigotry gives no sanction, to persecution no assistance, but generously affording to all, liberty

of conscience, and immunities of citizenship, deeming everyone, of whatever nation, tongue, or language, equal parts of the great Government Machine.

For all the blessings of civil and religious liberty which we enjoy under an equal and benign administration, we desire to send up our thanks to the Ancient of Days, the great Preserver of men, beseeching Him that the Angel who conducted our forefathers through the Wilderness into the Promised Land may graciously conduct you through all the difficulties and dangers of this mortal life. And when, like Joshua, full of days and full of honour, you are gathered to your Fathers, may you be admitted into the Heavenly Paradise to partake of the water of life and the tree of immortality.
