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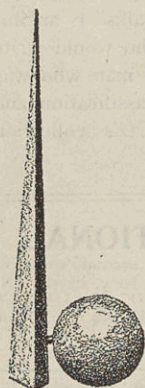

... At the Fair



The doors of the Jewish Palestine Pavilion at the New York World's Fair were opened to the public on Saturday evening, May 13th, ceding to a widespread demand that visitors be admitted to the exhibit in advance of the formal dedication exercises, which have been

set for Sunday, May 28th. An impressive program in which Professor Albert Einstein will be the central figure is being arranged for the ceremony.

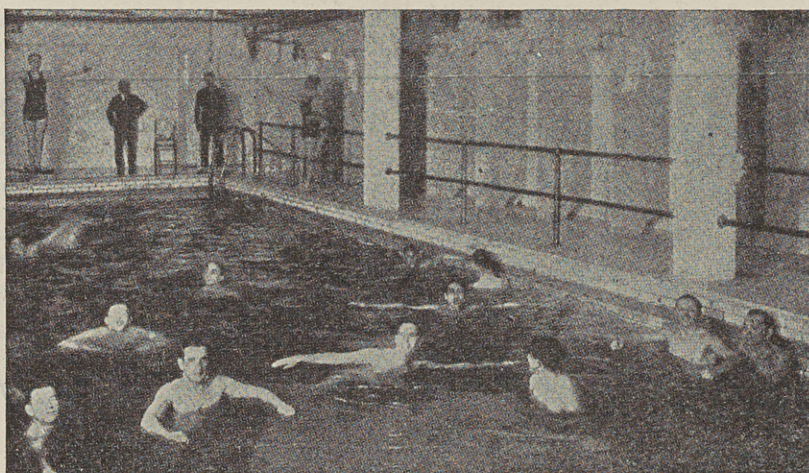
On Sunday, the first full day that the Pavilion was open to the public, 26,500 people entered the building, filling the main exhibition halls with a steady stream of visitors who viewed the inspiring exhibits of Jewish achievements in the rebuilding of Eretz Israel. Intense interest was shown in the special dioramic exhibits depicting the rise of modern Haifa, Tel Aviv and the Emek Jezreel, and panoramas of Jerusalem, Tiberias and the Dead Sea as well as a huge authentic model of the ancient Temple of Solomon. This dioramic exhibit is housed in a special wing of the building, and is open to holders of Palestine Pavilion Contributing Membership Certificates.

A considerable number of non-Jews, among them quite a few clergymen, were noted among the visitors to the Pavilion, which with its tropical landscaping is one of the most picturesque spots in the Fair grounds.

Recent Books Of Interest To I.S. Readers

THE HEROES. By Millen Brand. Simon & Schuster, New York. 336 pp. \$2.00.

Like "The Outward Room," Millen Brand's first novel, "The Heroes" is a story of regeneration through hope and work. Concerned with a one-armed veteran of the World War it is a moving and real portrayal of life in a Veteran's Home. Through this sombre, almost psychopathic, background the figure of George Burley emerges as a character who demands our respect more than our sympathy. For he is building a new life for himself.

Handling a sphere which many another novelist would find far too difficult, Millen Brand has avoided a bitterness of spirit and yet conveyed as distinct a censure of the aftermath of war as could be desired.

This is a novel in which a young author has not yet fulfilled himself—but the promise so notably displayed in "The Outward Room" has been sustained. From the same source we may confidently expect great things.

LINCOLN TALKS. Compiled by Emanuel Hertz. Viking Press, New York. 698 pp. \$3.00.

The major pitfall of biography as we know it today is the effort, on the part of the biographer, to prove his picture a true one. The approach is teleological, and the author too frequently busies himself with editing the words and deeds of the central figure to meet a preconceived pattern.

"Lincoln Talks" employs a technique which is diametrically opposed. For in this volume Emanuel Hertz, long known

for his knowledge of Lincolnia, has compiled thousands upon thousands of anecdotes and stories which Lincoln was in the habit of telling to neighbors, cabinet officials, disgruntled office-seekers, grateful petitioners, exasperated generals, political enemies, celebrities, millionaires and servants.

Through these words by the man himself, Lincoln appears, not with the suave coherent surface of many another too-pat biography, but as he was.

It is the inconsistency in a man's make-up that reveals him most genuinely, and for this reason "Lincoln Talks" is an important book to anyone who would write or talk or know the inner man who was called Lincoln. Careful classification and indexing have made Hertz's collection even more significant.

American Jewry Combats New British Palestine Policy; Protest Meetings Score Great Britain's "Betrayal"

"If I forget thee, Oh Jerusalem, may my right hand lose its cunning . . ." With these first words of the 137th psalm, Jews throughout the United States last Saturday registered firm disapproval of the British White Paper issued on the Palestine question in special services held all over the country.

Storm of Protest

A storm of protest met the proclamation which will virtually turn over Palestine to the Arabs. Two factors soon became apparent: that the British would be concertedly denounced, and that the determination to build Palestine would go on in spite of Great Britain's

betrayal.

In America concrete mass expression against Britain's action took the form of hundreds of rallies in various sections of the country. One of the largest of these held last Sunday afternoon, in the Hippodrome at New York, flayed the British renege on the Balfour declaration without mercy as thousands upon thousands constituted an overflow unable to be accommodated in the auditorium.

Symbolic of the attitude in Palestine itself was the impressive service at which Chief Rabbi Herzog tore up the White Paper in the Jerusalem protest meetings.
