Jewish Characters In English Books

Mendoza, in "The Duenna" exemplifies the final step in this trend. Mendoza was a comic character, he was ridiculous, he was the sign for general laughter, and in this respect, he is indicative of the change in the attitude towards the Jew which had effected itself in Sheridan's England.

Now, however, towards the end of the 18th century, a new spirit began to make itself felt throughout Europe. It was the germination of the seed of revolution which was to spring into flower in France. New ideals arose. The concept of liberty, equality, fraternity, filtered through the stage, and "The Jew" Cumberland, was presented in 1794. "The Jew" was, perhaps, the first attempt in the language, to correct the stereotype which had so embedded itself. But Sheva, the embodiment of all goodness and purity, was no more a true picture of the Jew than was Barabas, the epitome of evil.

The Victorian mood as represented by Scott, Dickens and Eliot, illustrated the diversity of approach to a creative problem which may be found in a single century.

Scott's "Ivanhoe" presented a double-faced picture. Rebecca was sympathetically developed, but her father, Isaac of York, was still discredited with the seemingly racial quality of avarice.

Fagin, whose very name has become a catchword for the baser elements in the human specie, was an over-sight by Dickens. In writing "Oliver Twist" the great Victorian novelist had no intention whatsoever of Jew-baiting. But the day after the novel appeared, a great reaction set in all over England, and emotions were current which had lain still for long. Dickens apologia was "Our Mutual Friend" with its benevolent Riah. According to certain of his letters it is apparent that the author held no personal prejudice.

But the most enlightened treatment of the Jew in English literature was that accorded him by George Eliot. She was a woman who was among the first to feel that what is inside a person is as important, than superficial external appearance. She understood that no man stands alone, but as the ultimate refinement of thousands of years of ancestors. Before writing her masterful "Daniel Deronda" she studied Jewish people, and Jewish culture. 'She identified herself with the struggle of this age-old people. And then she delineated Mordecai. He is the symbol of political regeneration in a Jewish homeland. He is not faultless. Neither is he without virtue. He is a faithful psychological picture.

This treatment, one which recognizes that any Jew in literature stands as a portrayal of all Jews, is the only literary treatment which can be just and fair. But a Christian world, and its authors and playwrights, has too often adumbrated the Jew as Barabas. They have forgotten, that he, too, was Christ.

JEWISH ODDITIES



SINCE the first presidential administration fifty-four Jews have served in the Congress of the United States. The first of this number to sit in the House of Representatives was Israel Jacobs who served from the State of Pennsylvania from 1791 to 1793. Hon. Isaac Siegel, President of the Institutional Synagogue, was the 22nd Jew to be elected to Congress.

Mrs. Julius Kahn of San Francisco has the distinction of being the only Jewess ever to have held office in the U. S. House of Representatives.

Although almost half of the number of Jewish congressmen

have represented New York State districts, the remaining Representatives have come from such widely scattered state as Wisconsin, Louisiana, Colorado, Illinois, California, Michigan, Massachusetts, Alabama, West Virginia and Florida.

Of the fifty-three Jews mentioned five served as United States Senators. The best known of these was Judah Philip Benjamin, Senator from Louisiana from 1853 to 1861. In the latter year he resigned to become Secretary of the State of the Confederacy.
