Book Reviews

TOMMY GALLAGHER'S CRUS-ADE. By James T. Farrell. Vanguard Press, New York. 91 pages. \$1.00.

Did you ever stop to wonder who the young men were that stood on Fortysecond Street and sold "Social Justice" Did you think they were "hired for the day" or really sincere "idealists" shouting slogans against the Jews?

Farrell presents a picture of Tommy Gallagher who is engaged in a crusade to take vengeance on the Jews. The young Tommy sells anti-semitic literature (Christian Justice), pickets a radio station that has barred Father Moylan, and attends party meetings.

The workings of the mind of Tommy Gallagher are revealed in all its brutality, dishonesty, and pathos. The intellectual poverty and spiritual nakedness of Gallagher are exposed.

This short volume is well worth reading for an understanding of a most vexing problem.

A Tribute To Judge Irving Lehman


