of a gymnasium or community center, due to an excessive amount of exertion, the organs of the body (such as the heart, lungs and voluntary muscles) are ex- erly adjusted supports. erted excessively. Also depending upon the sport indulged in, the ligaments and throat, spine and feet for any existing muscles of the inguinal region are heavily taxed, and potential hernias frequently become actual ones, if the inguinal region is inadequately protected.

#### Examination Necessary

We, therefore, as a result of a vast experience of examining club members who intend to avail themselves of gymnasiums, insist upon a routine medical examination, to determine the actual physical status. We place special emphasis upon the heart and its capacity in rela-

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The chest is examined for any evidence of tubercular lesions or any acute or chronic lung or bronchial disease.

#### Preventative Measures

In examining the abdomen, special stress is laid upon the observation of any existence of potential or actual hernia. The presence of a hernia, in our opinion should prevent the applicant from indulging in physical training or gymnastic exercises, unless repaired by surgical intervention, or protected by prop-

We also thoroughly examine the eyes, pathology. The existence of a spinal deviation or flat feet, although not considered by us as ruling out an individual application, are defects which should receive prompt attention and handling by a family physician.

#### Is Benefit To Member

The examining physician is interested in screening out any defects which may be corrected while the individual is young, and at the same time preventing any fatality or aggravation of a pre-existing condition which may be detrimental to the club member. In this manner the applicant is informed of his physical status, the institution has a history of the club member's health, and the physician is amply rewarded by having performed appreciative services.

### **Book Reviews**

THE PROPHETS. By Beryl D. Cohen. Scribners, New York. 232 pages,

"The Prophets" describes the personalities and teachings of the Hebrew seers, who waged a relentless war in behalf of G-d and against the people that succumbed to the idolatry and paganism of their day. The lives of the prophets, including Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Micah and Ezekiel, are dramatically portrayed in their historical settings. The book is replete with direct quotations from the prophets. With the exception of a few passages in which the author resorts to biblical criticism, the book can be recommended, if the reader knows to distinguish between the traditional viewpoint and that of biblical critics. Mostly technical points have been omitted so that the book is exceptionally readable.
