### April Important To U.S. Declares Judge Siegel

Magistrate Isaac Siegel in a recent speech declared that "April is the most important month in the history and welfare of our country."

#### The Month of Presidents

"April," he said, "is the month in which four Presidents were born." The four statesmen thus alluded to were Thomas Jefferson, born on the 13th, James Buchanan, born on the 23rd, Ulysses S. Grant, born on the 27th, and James Monroe, who was born on the 28th.

#### Declarations of War

War against Germany was declared on April 6th, 1917, and that against Spain was declared on April 24th, 1898.

Judge Siegel alluded to the fact that the battles of Concord and Lexington, the very start of American independence, were fought on April 19th, 1775.

The Civil War started when Fort Sumter was fired upon on April 12th, 1861, and the first battle of the Civil War was won when that fort surrendered on April 14th.

#### Discovery of the North Pole

The discovery of the North Pole was effected by the intrepid Peary on a frosty April 6th.

Abraham Lincoln, the Great Emancipator, was shot by Booth on the evening of April 14th, while he was attending a theatrical performance, and he died on the morning of April 15th, 1865.

# Book Reviews

THE FUGITIVE. By John Grane. Harper and Brothers, New York. \$2.00.

"The Fugitive" is another of the books to find their theme in the horror of present-day Germany. Yet it is not a tale of horrors. Nothing terrible really ever happens to Silbermann. It is in the lack Hebrew University . . . of event that a good part of the story is built up.

"The Fugitive" is after all a psychological study, one in which a man is reduced from self-assurance, perfect balance, better-than-normal adjustment, to a haggard, furtive, hunted prey. Mr. Grane has sketched the slow breakdown of morale, the tremendous, unspoken tension, the degradation of an ego. The book moves swiftly towards its climax through these successive stages of a decaying psyche until inevitably Silbermann goes insane.

The author has been clever in choosing material not hitherto exploited in this class of literature. He has taken the normal pattern rather than the heroic one, and made of Silbermann a symbolic, rather than an actual study, of life under the Nazi terror.
