The week following the very successful opening, Mr. Gustavus A. Rogers and Congressman Isaac Siegel participated in a symposium on "How the Synagogue Can Best Serve the Cause of Judaism." The two presidents were at their best and the audience had a most enjoyable evening.

"Good-will—When Will It Be?" was the topic on which Rabbi Lookstein spoke on the 24th to an audience which braved a rather inclement weather, but which was very well repaid by listening to a very able treatment of the timely subject. Dr. Samuel Nirenstein, well known to our forum audiences, was the speaker on the 31st. His "Philosophy of Judaism" delivered in an entertaining and popular manner was thoroughly enjoyed.
