THE WHYS AND WHEREFORES OF PURIM CUSTOMS

Why do we read the "Megillah" on Purim?

Because the "Megillah" tells of the suffering of our people during the decrees of Haman, the chief minister of King Ahasuerus of Persia. It tells of the beautiful Esther, the Jewish girl who became the Queen of Persia, and of her wise kinsman, Mordecai. It tells how Esther pleaded with the King for her people, who were doomed to death by Haman's decrees. It tells of the ultimate triumph of Esther and Mordecai over the wicked Haman and of the victory of our people over the enemies who sought their destruction.

Why do we send "Sholach Monoth" or gifts to one another on Purim?

Because there is no better way of celebrating the release from oppression than by showing kindness and good will towards our neighbors and friends. Our former suffering must also remind us of those who are in want and dire need today.

Why are "Homon Tashen" (Purim cakes) made in triangular shape?

Because the three points show that our people were saved because of their loyalty to the ideals of the patriarchs of Israel, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

Why do some people mask their faces on Purim?

Because, first it is a sign of jollity, and secondly because the word "Esther" comes from the Hebrew root which means to conceal or disguise
