# NEW ADMINISTRATION TAKES OFFICE Year of Greater Activity is Promised

# DAVID KASS, PRESIDENT, JACOB D. COHEN, VICE-PRESIDENT, AND ISAAC LIBERMAN, TREAS., FORMALLY INSTALLED

Amidst a wholesome and joyous spirit the newly elected officers of the congregation were formally inducted into office at the services on Saturday, May 7th.

Rabbi Margolies greeted the new administration in a brief talk in which he dwelt on the responsibility that the new officers must feel in their respective capacities as leaders of one of the foremost orthodox synagogues of the country.

In his sermon on "Kehilath Jeshurun-Its Past, Present and Future," Rabbi Lookstein emphasized the importance of a healthy social spirit in the congregation, as well as a keen interest in the young generation that is growing up. "The future of Kehilath Jeshurun will depend on the attention we give to, and concern we feel for the young of our synagogue," he said. "If fifty years of effort is not to be wasted, if the glorious past of our congregation is to be projected into the future, then the religious, educational and social life of our youth must be considered and effectively provided for.'

David Kass, the new president, then spoke briefly in the name of his Vice-President and Treasurer and thanked the members for the honor that he and his associates received in being entrusted with the leadership of the congregation. He spoke with praise of the outgoing administration, of Mr. Joseph Polstein, the President, Mr. Louis Robbins, his Vice-President, and Mr. Simon Bloch, the Treasurer. "Our plea," he said, "is for coöperation, and we feel that it will be copiously and abundently supplied by the membership body."
