#### BOARD OF KASHRUTH ORGANIZED

After much effort a successful attempt has been made to organize and regulate Kashruth in Yorkville. A Board of Kashruth composed of rabbis and laymen has been formed and two supervisors have been engaged to maintain a strict inspection and supervision of butcher shops and poultry markets in the neighborhood.

Certificates of Kashruth have been distributed to every butcher who is under the supervision of the Board, and who are to keep these certificates on display in their stores or shops. Consumers are urged to look for this certificate as a means of ascertaining the Kashruth of their dealer.

# LEAGUE FOR THE SUPPORT OF KASHRUTH

In order that the work of the Board of Kashruth shall function efficiently and in order to defray the expense entailed by supervision, a League for the Support of Kashruth has been formed. Membership is open to all who would see Kashruth maintained in this com-

munity. A nominal annual dues, the amount of which is left to the discretion of the individual, makes one a member of the League and a supporter of Kashruth.
