On November 15th, the Ramaz Academy will introduce a new feature into its school organization. Of late, there has been much demand for a kindergarten class for little boys and girls where Hebrew training would be combined with regular kindergarten work. We are now able to satisfy that demand.

A kindergarten class has now been arranged for under the supervision and guidance of one of the most able and experienced leaders in that field. Yona Alexander, who will direct this branch of the Ramaz Academy, has conducted similar educational programs in Cleveland, in Savannah, as well as in New York, with excellent success in all of them.
