#### Chanukah

Of all the holidays of the Jewish calendar, perhaps the most thrilling and inspiring is that of Chanukah. For this festival graphically and picturesquely represents heroism, self-sacrifice, and even martyrdom for the sake of a cause.

Today, people do not as a general rule sacrifice themselves for the sake of causes. There are some who contribute of their wealth and others of their effort, but very few who can become sufficiently enthusiastic or ecstatic to be able to feel that strange sentiment of "giving up" something, and not of merely "giving" something.

Chanukah should come to the Jew to rouse him out of his lethargy and to bring him the message of our Maccabbean ancestors. We cannot dedicate the lights of Chanukah unless we can translate those great experiences that occurred "beyomim hohem" (in those days) into living and revitalized efforts, activities, achievements and glories "bizman hazeh" (in this day of ours).

The first light of the Chanukah lamp is kindled this coming Sunday evening, November 28th. Make the Chanukah holiday a living reality in the experience of your children. Buy little lamps and candles for them; let them make their own blessings. Have them join in the songs and in the spirit of the great heroes of the Jewish people.

Let your little daughters help you prepare latkes; tell your children the story of the festival; have them exchange gifts with you and with each other, SEND YOUR CHILDREN TO THE SYNAGOGUE CHAPEL SHABBAS TO ATTEND THE CHILDREN'S SERVICE. Fill your home with the atmosphere and the symbols and the traditions of Jewish history.
