The Iew and Democracy

The Jewish people are scattered all over the globe. To the particular country in which they live, they owe loyalty and allegiance and a feeling of genuine patriotism. Peculiarly enough, because the Jew lives in a perennial diaspora, he must variously serve monarchical, dictatorial, communistic and democratic forms of government.

As far as the Jew is concerned, the ideal political philosophy is that of democracy. In view of the condition which makes the Jew a minority people wherever it may be, only democracy with its protective guarantees and its equitable opportunities can give security to Israel. Even where members of our people have risen to high position in totalitarian states there is no assurance that a slight change in the ruling group may not bring failure, dismissal and ignominy on the heels of even areat success.

The firmest hope of our people is in that type of government which gives adequate representation to all the constituent elements within its jurisdiction. The Jew can only thrive where freedom gives opportunity to him, to think and act and hope and advance within a land that holds out equal opportunity

for growth and development.
