#### Class in Customs and Ceremonies

Those who have not been attending the classes in Customs and Ceremonies conducted by Rabbi Lookstein on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday evenings of each month have been missing something indeed. The discussions led by the Rabbi after each informative lecture have been interesting and spirited.

At the very well attended class which met last Tuesday evening, the subject discussed was, "The Why and Wherefore of Mikyah."

#### Joseph Polstein of Blessed Memory

Mr. Joseph Polstein, former president of our congregation and an honorary trustee for the last two years, died at his home in Cedarhurst last Friday. Funeral services for him were held on Sunday morning in the synagogue with Rabbi Lookstein delivering the eulogy and Rev. Fingeroth chanting the memorial prayers. The synagogue was entirely filled by members of the congregation and friends from all walks of life who came to pay their last tribute to the deceased. The trustees of the congregation, headed by the president, Mr. Margareten, and the directors of Yeshiva College, headed by Mr. Harry Roggen, vice-president of the institution, acted as pallbegrers.

In his eulogy, Rabbi Lookstein spoke of Mr. Polstein's presidency of the congregation for seven years, his activity and generosity in Yeshiva College, his interest in Palestine and his general participation in all problems and movements in Jewish life.

The Rabbi said in part: "In speaking of the death of Joseph the bible says 'and Joseph died . . . and that entire generation.' With the passing of Joseph Polstein, there vanishes from the Jewish scene not alone an individual, but a type, not alone a person, but a personality, not alone a man, but a generation. Few men possess the high sense of duty, the profound loyalty, the will and zeal to serve and the knowledge and understanding of Jewish life and culture that Joseph Polstein, as an ideal Jewish layman, so eminently possessed."

The congregation herewith expresses to Mrs. Polstein, the sons and daughters and the entire family, their heartfelt sympathies and prays that the Almighty may keep all further sorrow from their door for many years to come.
