Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein Return

Rabbi and Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein returned from Europe on the Queen Mary this week. The Rabbi attended the Mizrahi World Conference and the Zionist Congress in Geneva. He was a member of the important Political Committee which framed the political resolutions of the Congress. While in Europe the Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein visited several refugee camps and studied at close range the situation of Jews in several European countries.

Those who met the Rabbi and his wife at the boat heard a vivid account of their experiences during the terrible days of tension in Europe preceding the declaration of war, and the perilous trip in the darkened Queen Mary across the North Atlantic. We are sure that the impressions of his journey and his observations of Jewish conditions in Europe will add vital color to the Rabbi's holiday sermons. We heartily welcome him and Mrs. Lookstein back to our midst and thank God for their safe return.

To permit for the preparation of food on the holiday for the Sabbath which immediately follows an Eruv Tavshilin must be made on Wednesday, Sept. 13th, Rosh Hashana Eve.

Important Notice

Admission to the High Holiday Services will be by ticket only. Members and seatholders alike, are requested to show their tickets to the special officer at the door. No one will be admitted without a ticket. This regulation is designed to save embarrassment to seat-holders, no less than to the synagogue. Those who have not yet made their seat reservations should do so at once. The Seat Committee will be in session Saturday night from 8 to 10:30 and Sunday all day.

Our Refugee Guests

It has been our practice in the past to leave a number of seats for those who cannot pay for their reservations. This year that number has been greatly increased and several benches have been set aside for German refugees and other deserving individuals in the community who will be the free guests of our congregation. We welcome them and we pray that next year may find them in happier and more comfortable material circumstances.

Synagogue Ordinances

Our worshippers, both old and new, are requested to be mindful of the following synagogue ordinances:

1. Come to the services as early as possible.
2. Join in the congregational singing.
3. Respect the wishes of the ushers on the floor.
4. Be in your seat before the sermon begins. Doors will be closed during the sermon.
5. Do not remove your talith or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of services.
6. Remember that admission is by ticket only.

The observance of these ordinances will make the services more decorous, more impressive and hence more inspiring to every worshipper.

Ramaz Academy Opens Registration

Registration of new students in the Ramaz Academy of our congregation began the day after Labor Day and will continue up to the opening of sessions on Sept. 18th.
