Sale of Chometz

Chometz that is left over the Passover may not be used after the holiday unless previously sold through the procedure prescribed by the Jewish law. Rabbi Lookstein may be seen for that purpose every morning and evening in the synagogue. No chometz may be sold after Monday, April 22nd, 10:45 A.M.
