SIDNEY A. MOSELY

ADDRESSES THE MEN'S CLUB

— on —

"HOW IMPORTANT TO AMERICA IS A BRITISH VICTORY?"

On Tuesday evening, February 11, Sidney A. Mosely, famous British journalist, author, and radio commentator, presented to a fascinated audience of Men's Club members and friends, the background of the present war situation, from the standpoint of his intimate knowledge and experience.

"In 1929, in Berlin," said Mr. Mosely, "I could see the beginning of the present war in the awakening of the military element. The lessons of the last war were forgotten. Street hoodlums and gangsters were taking charge of political Germany. And Chancellor Bruening was too weak to do anything about it.

"Two years later, when France could still do something about it, France did nothing. And the great men of Britain, like Beaverbrook and Churchill, were too preoccupied with purely British problems to think about it. A pacifist atmosphere pervaded England for the next few years, not only among the Cliveden set, but through all strata of society.

"Now every single mistake that was made over there has been repeated right here in America. Just as British isolationists could not see why they should help Czechoslovakia, American isolationists say why should we help Britain. It all has nothing to do with us, they think. But it is the very fact that the democracies would not stand together that gave Hitler a chance to knock them out one by one.

"But now America is beginning to realize where the danger to democracy lies. Today, ninety-nine out of every hundred know that Hitler must be smashed.

"There is a new spirit in England today, too. A spirit which has united all classes of society. The tide is turning in favor of Britain. With the help of America, she will be able to wipe out the foulest tyrant ever known to man."

Mr. Mosely's talk was followed by a question period in which the audience participated very fully. Because Mr. Mosely answered questions with such unusual thoroughness, he could not handle them all. However, he took the written questions with him, and promised to answer as many as he could during his radio talks.

The proceedings of the evening opened with the traditional singing of the "Star Spangled Banner," led by Cantor Fingeroth. Miss Gertrude Casriel favored the audience with piano selections by Schuman and Chopin. William Fischberg made a short but eloquent plea on behalf of the ticket sale for the benefit hockey game aiding the Bundles for Britain campaign. The Men's Club wishes to express its appreciation to Sam and Hy Bucher for their contribution toward the evening's collation.

Before the address by Mr. Mosely, Ira Weisman asked those present to rise for a thirty second period of silent tribute to our former President, the late Judge Katz.

William Dodd, Jr., son of the former Ambassador to Germany, will be the Men's Club's next guest speaker, on Tuesday, March 11.
