New Memorial Tablet To Be Built

The Sisterhood of the congregation is about to donate another handsome yahrzeit tablet for the east wall of the synagogue to balance the one that is now on the west wall. The old tablet is entirely filled and the new one will afford an opportunity to those who would like to inscribe the names of their departed dear ones as a tribute and as an eternal memorial.

The tablet will shortly be placed and reservations of placques may be made immediately. The price of a placque is \$100, plus an installation charge of \$5.00. Lights are provided on either side of each placque and are kindled on the yahrzeit for the person whose name is inscribed on it. In addition, the name on each placque is recorded on the yizkor scroll of the congregation and appropriate memorial prayers are recited at every yizkor service.

Spaces on the Memorial Tablet may be reserved by families for use whenever occasion demands. Fuller details may be obtained by writing to the synagogue office.

We ought to show as much concern for our final resting place as we do for our home in life. Members of one family ought to be united in death even as they are in life. In that way the family plot becomes not so much a burial ground as a family shrine.
