An Open Letter from the Rabbi

Dear Congregants:

It might appear incongruous in these days of universal misery that a people which is more exposed to suffering than any other should nevertheless prepare to observe the festival of Passover dedicated to emancipation and freedom.

Yet that is the spirit of the Jew which has rendered him so unyielding to all the destructive forces of time. To envison freedom in the midst of slavery, that is the prophetic gift of the Jew.

Is it not fitting therefore that all of our people should assemble in greater numbers than ever before, and pray during this festival of freedom for the emancipation and the liberation of all humanity. Let us pray for those who may now lie under the tyrant's heel that they lose not their courage and their hope. Let us pray for those who battle heroically against the forces of slavery and evil that their ultimate triumph may not be long delayed. Let us pray for America, the lighthouse of freedom, that she may casi a steady beam to guide those who may be in distress. Let us pray, above all, that within this land the shadows of hate and oppression may never fall.

Come to the synagogue this Pass-

over. The holiday happens to fall at a time when our fellow-citizens of other faiths are simultaneously observing a major religious festival of their own How appropriate that all of us of every faith and denomination should meet in our respective houses of worship where each may pray for the common good of all.

Remember that the glory of the festival, the beauty of its traditions, the impressiveness of its ritual are felt most in the Jewish home during the Seder service. Assemble with your respective families and participate in that service, explaining to the young and impressing upon the old the eternal message of Jewish freedom.

Remember, above all, that no Jewish festival is complete and no Seder night is worthy of its name unless hospitality and generosity are extended to the strangers in our midst. If possible have one at you seder table. If not, make sure that you have contributed something that will provide for those in need.

I wish you happy Seder evenings at home and I should love to extend personal greetings to you after services in the synagogue.

Sale of Chometz

The sale of Chometz is not merely a formality but rather an important law, the observance of which is necessary for the maintenance of the Kashruth of a Jewish home. Chometz (food or utensils) that is retained over the Passover holidays may not be used after the holiday unless previously sold through the procedure prescribed by the Jewish law. The sale of Chometz will begin Sunday, April 6th and will continue until Friday, April 11th. Rabbi Lookstein may be seen for that purpose in the Synagogue every morning and evening.

Service for the First Born

The traditional service for the first born will be conducted on Friday, April 11th, following the regular morning services which will be held as usual at 7:15. It is obligatory upon all first born to attend this special service. Where the first born is a minor, the parent may attend the service in his place.

PASSOVER CAUTIONS

It is important to bear in mind certain do's and don'ts in connection with the Passover holiday.

1. No Passover food articles should be bought loose. Only articles which are packed and sealed and bear the stamp of approval of a recognized rabbi or rabbinic organization should be bought.

2. Remember to have some Palestine products on your Seder table.

3. If you are in doubt about the method of kosherizing utensils for Passover, please consult the Rabbi.

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
