A TIMELY LETTER FROM THE RABBI

Dear Congregants:

When the month of Adar enters, our sages say, joy should increase. Alas, that this year this cannot be so. As Americans and as Jews we are weighed down by the universal tragedy.

Yet it is not of tragedy that we must think, but of the power necessary to sustain us through it. A great source of power is to be found in our capacity to forget ourselves in service for others. Moved by that consideration, I call to your attention our annual Passover ap-

The demand for Passover necessities will not be merely local this year. It will not only include the poor of our immediate community. It will extend to the camps where our boys are serving their country and preparing for an even greater service. For as many of them as will desire it, we should like to provide kosher food, matzohs and other Passover necessities.

Our help will have to reach Jews in concentration camps, in occupied France and other parts of Europe. Through the Red Cross it is possible to reach some of them. We will have to provide for the stranded rabbis and students in Shanghai, in Bombay and other parts of the world who are trapped in all of these spots by the calamitous war in the Pacific.

You see, dear friends, how extensive our help must be this year. For all the purposes enumerated above we will have to allocate some small sum. The contribution we made last year will hardly be sufficient to cover the increased needs of this year. Each one of us, therefore, will have to give a good deal more.

A fair estimate of the obligation insofar as our congregation is concerned, should make our quota for this year's Passover relief fund \$2,000. On the basis of the amount realized last year it means that each one of us should increase his last year's contribution by 50%. One who contributed \$100 last year, ought to donate \$150; a \$50 donor of last year should give \$75; and one who only gave \$5 last year is expected to give \$7.50 this year.

Forgive me, dear friends, for being so mathematical and commercial in my appeal to you. I am slightly familiar with the suffering, the want and the need and I do not mind, therefore, resorting to unrabbinic and business techniques in order to help save lives.

I beg of you to respond generously and quickly. Make your checks payable to the Benevolent Fund of our congregation from which it will be allocated for the various purposes described in this letter. God's blessings upon you for all that you will do and God grant that ere another Passover rolls round, Israel and the world shall have attained redemption and peace.
