Jewish Nationality is Rabbi's Theme This Saturday

The Rabbi on Income Tax

New York City

Rabbi Lookstein will this Saturday morning deliver the third in a series of lectures on the subject, "The Varieties of Jewish Nationality." Additional worshippers have been coming to hear these lectures and they have stimulated a great deal of discussion. It is hoped that many more will come, especially this Saturday, to hear the Rabbi's discourse because he expects to come to actual grips with the painful and perennial problem of Jewish survival.

In his sermon last Saturday the Rabbi explained that the Jew could not be considered a race. Quoting a number of anthropologists and sociologists, he showed that the contention of Jewish racialism was advanced by two elements — the anti-semite and the fanatic Jewish chauvinist.

"Judaism is more than a creed," the Rabbi said. "The tendency to creedalize Judaism and to make of the Jewish people a religious community and no more are the results of so-called Jewish emancipation that began in the eighteenth century. Assimilationists thought that in that way they would guarantee Jewish security in the diaspora. That they have been in error has, alas, been so tragically proven during the last decade."

We urge you to be in synagogue this Saturday not only because of the special Rosh Chodesh prayers but also to hear the continuation of this subject in the thrilling manner in which our Rabbi presents it. March 15th is the deadline for income tax. As good citizens we will of course be sure that our returns are in before that date. As good Jews there is another deadline to which I want to call your attention. I refer to the Passover relief which must be distributed no later than a week before the holiday. This means that our contributions must be in by the twenty-sixth of March, which leaves us no more than about two weeks to send our contributions in.

I am a little disappointed by the returns thus far. Yet I cannot believe that our members and friends will this year especially fail to do their duty. There are our boys at camp who must be remembered. There are the Jews of Russia to whom we would like to send something. There are the hundreds of students distributed literally over the seven seas to whom our aid must reach. The kind and generous hearts of our people will not remain untouched by all that need.

I beg you again, dear friends, to please send your contributions at once. See that your name appears in our weekly list of contributors and please make your contribution larger than that of last year by at least 50%. Thank you and God bless you.
