RECORD ENROLLMENT AT RAMAZ

The Ramaz School opened its seventh academic year with an enrollment of over 160 students and with a teaching staff that includes many new appointees. All classes are now full and registration is closed except for the kindergarten which is still open to a few registrants.

Among the new features at Ramaz this year is the domestic science laboratory which has been equipped to the last detail and which will offer courses to the girls in all the home making arts. In addition to the usual course of domestic science, the girls will be taught the management of a modern kosher Jewish home. The whys and wherefores of the dietary laws, their rational validity and their practical utility in the maintenance of Jewish life will all form part of the course of study. The Ramaz domestic science laboratory and course are indeed unique in scope and purpose and they have already won the interest of many educators.

OUR AFTERNOON RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

For the children of our congregants there is available the Central Jewish Institute Talmud Torah as a three day a week Religious School. Registration is going on now and parents who are interested may consult either the Rabbi or Mr. Karni, principal of the Talmud Torah.
