Chanukah Super and Dance

Religious School Committee Meets

The Religious School Committee of the Congregation met last Sunday morning in the library of the synagogue. Professor Maurice Finkelstein, chairman of the Committee, presided and every member of the Committee was present. Mr. Leon Karni, principal of the Central Jewish Institute Talmud Torah, gave a comprehensive picture of the Religious School now in operation. The discussion which followed concerned itself with policies, principles and programs for the Religious School when it will come under the auspices of the Congregation next fall.

The Rabbi's Sermon

The daily press has recently been reporting acts of terror in Palestine. Prime Minister Winston Churchill last week made a statement in Parliament concerning these acts. Intelligent Jews ought to be informed about the circumstances concerning the entire matter. When a Prime Minister speaks, as Mr. Churchill did, his words may affect the entire course of Jewish history for many years.

The Rabbi has, therefore, chosen to speak this Saturday morning on "Terror in Palestine: The Cause, the Responsibility and the Solution." Being intimately familiar with circumstances and conditions in Palestine, our Rabbi may be expected to give a very informative discourse on the entire problem. No Jew, man or woman, whose heart beats for the welfare of his people, should miss an opportunity for much needed information on this entire subject. By all means, be in synagogue this Saturday.

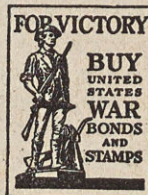

The children of Ramaz received a citation from the U.S. Treasury for the successful sale of war stamps and bonds. The amount raised last year was sufficient to pay for a Ra-

maz jeep.

Captain Johnson, a Britisher who served under General Montgomery in France, visited the school last week and thrilled the children with some of his stories.
