PASSOVER RELIEF

We herewith announce our annual Passover relief appeal, the quota of which this year is five thousand dollars.

By way of explaining this quota, which is by far the largest ever set, it is necessary to state a few important facts. Our regular allocation to the Yorkville Passover relief fund is to be made out of the proceeds of this fund. A portion of it must go to our boys in the service in order that they may be provided with Passover necessities. The largest portion we intend to give to the Vaad Hahatzala an organization which through underground methods, is instrumental in saving thousands of our brethren in occupied Europe.

Through the efforts of this organization twelve hundred Jews were saved only a fortnight ago and are now safely established in refugee camps in Switzerland. Many tens of thousands more can be saved if the means are provided.

It is not necessary to tug at the heartstrings in order to make our congregants realize the urgency of our Passover appeal this year. Our contributors will not only be providing the usual Passover necessities for the needy people, they will actually be making possible the saving of lives — lives that otherwise are doomed to cruel extermination. Please respond, therefore, as promptly as possible and with utmost generosity.

He completed his address with an analysis of the chief cause of anti-semitism which to Rev. Holmes was principally psychological. The Christians being in such heavy spiritual debt to Judaism, have developed a debtor-to-creditor complex and as such, the mere presence of the debtor is a constant reminder of an eternal obligation which becomes irksome, to say the least. This embarrassment turns eventually to hatred of and malice towards the benefactor, hence anti-semitism.
