WELCOME HOME RABBI LOOKSTEIN

"Blessed Shalt Thou Be At Thy Coming In"

As this Bulletin goes to press our Rabbi is on his way home from the San Francisco Conference where he spent the last two weeks. Rabbi Lookstein will arrive in New York on Thursday, May 17th, Shevuoth Eve. The entire congregation joins us in extending a hearty welcome to our Rabbi.

THE SHEVUOTH SERMONS

The congregation will have the opportunity to hear first hand, news on the goings on in San Francisco. We learned that Rabbi Lookstein has had the opportunity to meet with Jewish and non-Jewish leaders of national and international fame to discuss with them the question concerning the Jews remaining in Europe and also the vital problem of the future of Palestine as a Jewish Commonwealth. His principal assignment was to the Latin-American delegation. The Rabbi also addressed several audiences and spoke on the radio.

On Shevuoth Rabbi Lookstein in his sermons will share with us his experiences of the past two weeks. He will speak on Friday on the subject "San Francisco and Sinai—An Eye-Witness Report of the United Nations Conference." On Saturday, the second day of Shevuoth he will speak on "First Fruits from San Francisco." We know that from our Rabbi we may expect a lucid and learned report. The highlights and shadows of the Conference will be revealed with the characteristic forthrightness for which our pulpit is noted.

Be in our synagogue this Shevuoth and listen to Rabbi Lookstein. Your holiday will be more meaningful and significant as a result.

A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

San Francisco, May 14, 1945

Dear Congregants:

I am speaking to you from the Golden Gate. That metaphor is significant. Out of San Francisco may emerge the pattern of a new world, and humanity may as a result pass through a golden gate leading to great promise and rich fulfillment. Behind us will be left a wilderness of chaos and barbarism, a jungle of cruelty and savagery. Ahead of us may lie brotherhood, freedom, justice and everlasting peace.

Do not however, dear friends, assume that the Utopian State and ideal society are immediately at hand. Here the groundwork only is being laid; the foundations are being sunk. The structure is yet to be built. We can only hope and pray that the efforts expended here may be blessed so that richer blessings may come tomorrow. The blood and tears that have been shed justify this hope and make reverent the prayer.

For our people, San Francisco must not prove yet another illusion. We are too sore and weary to suffer any additional frustration or disappointment. Our price—five million dead—is much too costly to end in further perplexity and bewilderment. Surely we may expect some compensation for all our pain, some reward for our unparalleled suffering.
