RABBI LOOKSTEIN LEAVING FOR SOUTH AMERICA

At the urgent request of the Joint Distribution Committee Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein consented to undertake a trip to South America this summer. The Rabbi, accompanied by Mrs. Lookstein, expects to leave New York the end of June and is scheduled to return shortly before the High Holy Days. In the coure of his trip he will visit the Jewish communities in the larger cities of South America.

Mr. Paul Baerwald, President of the Joint Distribution Committee. wrote to the Board of Trustees of the Congregation and asked that the Rabbi be made available for this trip. In his letter Mr. Baerwald emphasizes the importance of the mission and the great good that is expected to result from it. Mr. Boerwald wrote in part, "We feel that Rabbi Lookstein's high standing in the Jewish world here, his deep knowledge and understanding of Jewish life the world over would be of tremendous value in the work in which we are all interested. Although our first concern is to inform the South American Jewish communities about the overseas situation and what is required there for rebuilding, I think there would be

other benefits to Jewry coming out of a personal visit by and contact with Rabbi Lookstein. I think that our South American brethren would become more keenly aware of their privileges and obligations. I think, too, that the impressions which Rabbi Lookstein would bring back with him would be of great value to us here in the United States."

The Congregation naturally feels honored that its Rabbi has been selected for such an important mission. The membership of Kehilath Jeshurun and of its affiliates extends to the Rabbi and his dear wife heartiest wishes for a successful journey and a safe return. May God's blessing's attend them everywhere and bring them back to us in health and in good cheer.

An opportunity will be offered to the membership of the Congregation, Men's Club and Sisterhood to bid Bon Voyage to the Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein at a Cocktail Party on Monday, June 25th, between the hours of 4 and 6 in the afternoon in our Social Hall. Invitations to that function will shortly be in the mail.

SECOND HALF OF BUILDING FUND CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED

Additional Seventy Thousand Dollars Required

The Building Fund Campaign for one hundred thousand dollars begun last year entered its second phase this week. The amount thus far raised which exceeded half of the quota was used for the purchase of the Central Jewish Institute building and for the other purposes originally outlined.

Synagogue Alterations New Objective

An additional fifty thousand dollars must now be raised and will be used entirely for the remodelling, redecorating and alteration of our synagogue structure. The plans for these alterations have already been submitted by the architect.

Of course, there will have to be added to this amount the sum of twenty thousand dollar for the regular budgetary needs of the congregation during the current year. All in all, therefore, our task is to raise seventy thousand dollars.

Campaign Well On Its Way

The Board of Trustees of the Congregation met with an intimate group of devoted workers at the home of Rabbi Lookstein last Thursday night and announced the official launching of the campaign. The Rabbi explained to the gathering that he was very anxious to see the campaign well on its way before he left for South America. It was further explained that pledges and contributions announced in the course of the campaign would be in place of those

normally announced at the Kol Nidre Night appeal.

Those who attended the meeting responded enthusiastically and generously and close to half of the new quota was pledged that night. In addition to their own contributions many promised to contact others in the interests of the campaign.

Bernard and Cummings Co-chairmen

Mr. Abbott Bernard and Mr. Israel Cummings were appointed co-chairmen of the campaign. Both have not only given generously themselves but have given their assurances to devote time and effort to the leadership of the project. They in turn were promised the full cooperation of all present.

The New Challenge

The members and friends of Kehilath Jeshurun are now faced with a new challenge. We have gone a long way since last year. We have come into possession of a synagogue house. We have become the sponsors of an afternoon religious school which will henceforth be under our auspices. We have embarked upon a program of expansion that promises to add further glory to our cong-

His doctoral dissertation, not yet published, is on the subject of bi-lingualism. He is also a graduate of the Teachers Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary.

Mr. Axelrod brings to his new post varied accomplishments and experience. He is a qualified state psychologist and has functioned as such in many institutions. For a number of years he was connected with the Brooklyn High School for Specialty Trades where he served as Psychologist and Vocational Guidance Counselor. And on that subject he lectured before numerous Parents Teachers Associations throughout New York and New Jersey.

We feel confident that in Mr. Axelrod our congregation has obtained a gentleman of high quality whose experience will be felt in the development of our educational activities, as well as in our administrative affairs. We welcome him heartily into our midst, and we assure him of our fullest cooperation and extend to him and Mrs. Axelrod our heartiest good wishes.
