LIKE A TREE UPROOTED

In his second address last Saturday on "What I Saw in Europe," Rabbi Lookstein dealt with the Jewish survivors—their fate and future. He deplored the utter destruction of a thousand years of Jewish life in Europe and showed how every aspect of Jewish existence has been uprooted like a tree, family life extinguished, the youth exterminated, the intellectuals annihilated, and the community wiped out.

This Saturday the Rabbi will deliver his third and last address of the series. His subject will be; "Our Occupation Policy in Germany—A Rabbi's Evaluation." Lately much has been written about this subject in the daily press and in the periodicals. We are sure that our congregants will want to hear the facts as presented by our Rabbi.
