SYNAGOGUE WORK TO COST \$100,000

**Plans Filed for Modernizing
Kehilath Jeshurun Property
on East 85th Street**

Plans for altering and modernizing the synagogue edifice of the Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun at 117-25 East 85th Street and its recently acquired social center and school building adjoining, at a cost of approximately \$100,000, were filed yesterday with the Department of Housing and Building by J. M. Berlinger, architect.

The plans call for the combining of the two buildings, with a large common lobby at the street level. This will necessitate the removal of the present exterior stone steps up to the main floor of the synagogue and the present interior stairs leading from the school building entrance to the second floor.

A new chapel to accommodate 150 persons for daily prayer will be one of the main features of the ground floor in the synagogue building. In the rear of this chapel and the new library will be a large dining room to be used primarily at lunch time by the 300 or more children attending the religious and cultural classes.

In the synagogue proper, there will be a new ceiling of orderly arranged recessed panels with indirect cove lighting. The wood-paneled facias of the balcony will be replaced by a marble facie lower in height to increase visibility, and superimposed columns that support the balcony and roof of the synagogue.

SHABBAT SHEKALIM

The First of Four Important Sabbaths

This Sabbath is known as Shabbat Shekalim and is the first of four important Sabbaths that precede the Passover festival. In ancient days it was the practice to announce on the first day of Adar the collection of a poll tax. This consisted of half a shekel which was used for various public services in the Temple.

The other three significant Sabbaths are known as Sabbath Zachor immediately preceding Purim, Shabbat Parah and Shabbat Hachodesh. One each of these Sabbaths special prayers are recited and a special portion of the Torah is read appropriate to the occasion.

On this Shabbat Shekalim, in addition to the special services, Rosh Chodesh prayers for the new month of Adar II will be recited. Rosh Chodesh will be on Sunday and Monday.

Let us all come to the synagogue this Sabbath to usher in the season of joy and festivity.

OUR FEBRUARY MEETING

Those who braved the snowstorm to attend our monthly forum on Tuesday, February 19th were amply rewarded for their efforts. They heard a fascinating address delivered by Dr. Carl Herman Voss on the subject: "Palestine, The Middle East and Minorities."

Dr. Voss, who is Chairman of the Christian Committee on Palestine, traced the history of Zionism during the last five decades and paid tribute to its immortal founder, Dr. Theodore Herzl. He pointed out that now, fifty years after the publication of Herzl's "Judenstadt," the world is beginning to appreciate the keen understanding and prophetic vision of this great Zionist leader. His profound historical analysis of the position of the Jew among the nations has been completely vindicated by the cataclysmic events of our day. It is no longer necessary to defend Zionism, since its most ardent opponents have become its faithful followers.

Dr. Voss spoke with great admiration of the achievements of the pioneers in Palestine and expressed the hope that both England and the United States will help to bring about the realization of Herzl's dream — the establishment of a Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine.

After the meeting, the members partook of the refreshments served in the Social Hall.
