We, of the synagogue, are particularly happy to welcome back into our midst our own sons and daughters, and to give expression to these sentiments, we have decided to dedicate a special Sababth for that purpose. We invite the veterans and their families to come to our synagogue and participate in these impressive "Gomel" services.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETS MARCH 27

PASSOVER RELIEF APPEAL

At this time of the year as we approach the Passover holidays, it is our religious obligation to announce our annual Passover relief appeal the quota of which is five thousand dollars.

A substantial sum will be allotted for the purchase of special Passover packages to be sent to our stricken brethren in the DP camps in Germany. It is not necessary for us to elaborate on the worthiness of these causes. If you were asked to save the life of a Jew, we know what your response would be. That is exactly what we are asking you to do through our Passover Appeal.

We ask you in the name of mercy to make your contribution more generous than ever before. Remember that you are in a position to save the life of a fellow Jew. We cannot say more

GAY PURIM

A Week of Festivities

All who participated in our Purim celebration will agree that this was a grand community festival in the full sense of the word. In addition to the customary synagogue services, which were well-attended, several celebrations were held in our Synagogue House. A capacity congregation of men, women and children ushered in the holiday with the traditional reading of the Megillah in the main synagogue last Saturday night. The beautiful rendition of the Book of Esther by our ritual director Mr. Joseph Adler, accompanied by the usual "gragers" and noise makers in the hands of the gay and orderly youngsters set the tone for the celebration. After the service, the entire congregation gathered in the Social Hall where holiday greetings and felicitations were exchanged over a cup of coffee and "hamantaschen."

On Sunday morning, the festivities were resumed with the regular Purim service and reading of the Megillah followed by a community break-

At 10:30, a grand Purim Party was held for the children in the gaily decorated Synagogue House. Every available seat in the auditorium, as well as on the balcony, was occupied by the eager and jolly youngsters of our Congregation, the Religious School and the Ramaz School. Many of them were dressed in colorful Purim costumes. The program of entertainment featured Peter Pan, the Magic Man whose bag of tricks and surprising stunts fascinated the young audience. He was followed by Norbets' Musical Puppet Show, which was greatly enjoyed by all. Judging from the tremendous applause and the merriment of the youngsters, this was a perfect Purim Party, one that will long be remembered by them.

On Monday night, the Adult Classes of our Congregation celebrated Purim in their own fashion. They sang holiday songs, led by Miss Gozela Adler, one of the students, and partook of the delicious Purim refreshments.

The culmination of the festival was marked by the Men's Club Purim Celebration on Tuesday niaht, March 19th. Acting as host to the Congregation and Sisterhood, the Men's Club greeted a record throng of men and women who filled every seat in the auditorium. Many of them brought "Shalach Monos" offerings in the form of packages of food and medical supplies for our needy brethren in Europe.
