A High Holiday Message from the Rabbi

"Ye stand this day, all of you, before God." Thus, Moses spoke to our ancestors as they stood at the edge of the wilderness on the threshold of the promised land. So, too, may our generation be addressed as it emerges from the catastrophy of war and faces the uncertain dawn of peace.

More than a year has elapsed since the day of, victory over the enemies of mankind. And yet, how far off peace seems to be. Those who but yesterday were comrades in arms are now ridden with fear and suspicion, doubting each other's word, suspecting each other's motives.

For Israel, the end of war brought not rest nor peace, but disillusionment and frustration. The remnants of our people, scant survivors of six million dead, still languish on the blood-drenched continent of Europe. Gone is the terror of the concentration camp, but present, alas, is the indignity of the displaced person's camp.

And the Holy Land of Israel, repository of a people's hope and dreams, of its past greatness and future glory—it, too, knows no peace nor security. The brave sons and daughters who drained her swamps and dried her marshes have been driven to perplexity and desperation by the incitations and tauntings of those who once were friends. Alas, that the City of Peace knows no peace.

Will our generation realize its failure and its folly? Will it recognize the responsibility and the challenge that confront it? What will be determined within our life-time will become the pattern for ages to come. Will we be late for our rendezvous with destiny?

"Ye stand this day, all of you, before God." Statesmen of the world, captains of nations, and humble men of all walks of life, know you not that our generation is now molding the fate of peoples and civilization for millenia to come. "Neither with you only do I make this covenant and oath . . . but also with him that is not here with us this day."

This is the higher meaning of Standing before God. In the appreciation of this meaning and in our consecration to its realization, will we prove deserving to be inscribed in the Book of Life. Leshana Tova Tikatevu.

RAMAZ OPENS WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT

The Ramaz School, sponsored by our Congregation, opened its 10th year with an enrollment of close to 300 children in the elementary and high school departments. On the register of the school are children from all parts of the city. A number of parallel grades had to be opened up in order to accommodate the large enrollment. Almost 100 children who applied for admission had to be refused for lack of space. An interesting historical note is the fact that exactly ten years ago, Ramaz School opened for the first time with a register of six children. Such has been the deserved and phenomenal growth of the institution.

SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holy Days. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

(1) Admission to the services during the High Holy Days will be by card only. This rule will be strictly

enforced.

(2) We do not expect to have any vacant seats during the holidays. We, therefore, ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise, will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.

- (3) The doors are closed during the sermon. Please, therefore, be in your seat before the sermon begins.
- (4) Please join in the congregational singing.
- (5) Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.
- (6) Please do not remove the Talith or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.
- (7) The Synagogue ushers do their job voluntarily and devotedly. Please cooperate with them by respecting their wishes.
