Diamond Jubilee Resolution

WHEREAS, the year 1947 marks the 75th year since the founding of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun, and

WHEREAS, Kehilath Jeshurun has during the seventy-five years of its existence maintained itself as a congregation, loyal to the traditions of Israel and faithful to the laws and practices of the Jewish religion as recorded in the Sulchan Aruch, and

WHEREAS, Kehilath Jeshurun has throughout its history encouraged its members and worshippers to live in accordance with the traditions of our faith and to be ever responsive to the needs and problems of the Jewish people everywhere, and

WHEREAS, Kehilath Jeshurun always sought to impart the religion and culture of Israel to succeeding generations by the establishment and maintenance of religious schools for the young, and

WHEREAS, the achievements and traditions of Kehilath Jeshurun over the years have helped to advance the prestige and influence of traditional Judaism in this land,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that:-

The year 5707 on the Jewish calendar be declared the Diamond Jubilee year of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun and that commencing with the High Holy Days of that year, a series of events be planned for the fitting and appropriate celebration of the occasion.

In that during the course of the year, through lectures and sermons, there be presented an interpretation and evaluation of Traditional Judaism as a valid and abiding way of life for the American Jew.

¶ That government regulations permitting, the synagogue structure and the Synagogue House be completely renovated during the course of the year and that a Festival of Rededication be observed upon the completion of the work.

In that a Diamond Jubilee Fund of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars be collected during the course of the year to be used partly for the religious and educational activities of the congregation, partly for the proposed alterations of the synagogue and the Synagogue House, and partly for the liquidation of the mortgage debt of the synagogue.

In making these resolutions, we express in reverence and humility our gratitude to Almighty God for the wisdom and idealism that He gave to the founders of the congregation, and for His bounty and goodness to us over the years. We invoke His benediction upon us and upon our children and upon those who will come after them. May His presence never depart from our midst.

HIGHLIGHTS IN THE HISTORY OF KEHILATH JESHURUN

During the Diamond Jubilee Year of our congregation, we expect to publish from time to time historical material touching upon the life and fortunes of our congregation. We propose also to present biographical sketches of the leading personalities who founded, molded and directed the congregation. It is natural that we concern ourselves first with incidents, events and personalities associated with the early beginnings of our congregational history.

The source material for the present installment was obtained in an historical address delivered by the late Simon M. Roeder at the ceremonies marking the laying of the corner stone of our present synagogue structure. These ceremonies took place on Sunday, May 4, 1902. The president of the congregation at that time was the late Moses Davis, of blessed memory.

... In the fall of 1872 at a meeting attended by Abba Baum, Frank Ephraim Goldman, I. Gruhn, Jacob Hecht, M. Levy and Jacob Webster, it was decided to form a "chevra for divine worship." Jacob Hecht was elected president and the name adopted for the new congregation was Anshe Jeshurun of Yorkville.

Apparently, the young "chevra" either could not afford or could not find a meeting place of its own. Religious services, therefore, were conducted at the private home of the founders. An item in the Jewish Messenger of November 27, 1885 speaks of services being held at the home of Frank Ephraim Goldman, and of others. Finally, Parupa Hall, situated then at 86th Street and Third Avenue, was rented and services were conducted there. In 1878, the government authorities decided to turn Parupa Hall into a post office and the young congregation was left with no permanent place of worship. It had to move from one hall to another until the year 1881.

In that year, a house was bought on Second Avenue near 82nd Street which was used by the congregation for about two years. It was sold at a profit of eleven hundred dollars.

A complete reorganization of the "chevra" then took place, at which time the present name of Kehilath Jeshurun was given to it. It was incorporated in Albany and a charter was obtained. A house was purchased at 127 East 82nd Street, was shortly demolished and the erection of the first permanent synagogue was begun. It was completed in 1884.

In 1885, Rabbi M. J. Peikes was elected Rabbi, and two years later the Reverend S. Jacobson was appointed Cantor.

that a religious school was established soon after the founding of the congregation. In a newspaper item on November 12, 1886 there is a report of one hundred children "mostly girls" on the rolls of religious school which "meets Sunday morning and is under the superintendence of Reverend Koppel Newman and other volunteer teachers."

the trials and fortunes of those early days. By 1886, there was a well organized Sisterhood connected with the congregation. Its official name was the Ladies Auxiliary Society. On June 6th of that year, the ladies presented a Torah to the congregation, and on June 3rd of the succeeding year, a Strawberry Festival was conducted by the organization at Parupa Hall. The officers during that year were: Mrs. Rutsky, President; Mrs. Keirsky, Vice-President; Mrs. Newman, Secretary; and Mrs. Webster, Treasurer.

. . . By 1898, the congregation had grown to such an extent that the need was felt for a new building with increased facilities for the expanding activities. Up to that year, the leadership of the congregation was vested in the hands of the following who served as presidents in the order named: H. Schnitzer, Abba Baum, Jacob Hecht and Theodore Crohn. Moses Davis was then elected to the presidency, and under his administration, a committee was appointed to select a suitable site for the erection of a more spacious synagogue. His fellow officers were David Berg, Vice-President; Moses Phillips, Treasurer; and Joseph Stampfer, Secretary.

... After much study and searching, the lots 117, 119 and 121 East 85th Street were purchased for the sum of forty-five thousand dollars, and on February 3, 1901, a building committee was appointed consisting of Solomon Bachrach, Isaac Cohen, Frank Ephraim Goldman, Jacob Hecht, Samuel I. Hyman, Isaac Lieberman and Samuel J. Silberman.

. . . Thus began and grew the congregation of which we are a part. Thus did our forebears plan, dream and build. In the issues of the Bulletin that will follow, more of the glorious record of their labors will be told. As we open Diamond Jubilee Year, we cannot help but feel gratitude and reverence for those early religious pioneers. May we prove worthy as their descendants.
