CHANUKAH 5707 By Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein

It is more than 2,100 years ago that the miracle of Chanukah was wrought. Twenty-one centuries have elapsed since the triumph of the Maccabees over the legions of the Syrian Greeks. Twenty-one centuries have come and gone since those days when "the strong were conquered by the weak, the many by the few, the unclean by the clean, the wicked by the righteous."

The Maccabean Wars were the most decisive in the history of the world. Upon their outcome, the destiny of mankind depended. Had Antiochus won, Pagamism would have engulfed the world and for millenia, might not have receded. The victory of Mattathias and his sons made possible the survival of Judaism and ultimately the birth of Christianity as well. Modin, birthplace of the Maccabean family, is certainly significant for the Jewish people. For the non-Jewish world, it might be more significant than even Bethlehem.

What was at stake in those days? At stake was the issue of spirit against force, of might against right, of God against idolatry, of external



grandeur against inner majesty. Hellenism stood for the former; Judaism for the latter. The one typified, in the metaphor of Yehuda Halevi, flowers—ornate, beautiful and attractive. The other represented fruit—nourishing, sustaining and creative.

When the little cruse of oil, bearing the seal of the High Priest was found in the desecrated temple, it became the symbol of the human spirit stamped by the seal of the divine. When the undefiled contents of that cruse lighted up the temple courts for eight consecutive days, it heralded the triumph of man, made in God's image, over all the forces of evil. The menorah is the emblem of the Jewish people. It might well supersede Crescent and Cross as the emblem of all humanity.

Have the Maccabean Wars ended? Alas, not yet. A few battles were won, but the final victory has yet to be gained. Tyranny and oppression are not fully conquered. The dignity of man is not yet firmly established. The Kingdom of God is still remote. The atomic bomb threatens to extinguish the small and flickering light of the Chanukah lamp. The Swastika as a visible symbol is destroyed, but it has yet to be up-rooted from the hearts and minds of some men and some nations.

Chanukah 5707 must, therefore, move us to renewed dedication to the ideals for which our fore-fathers fought. For twenty-one centuries, we carried aloft the menorah of idealism. In spite of all the winds of wickedness, we managed to keep it burning. Let us guard its glow. As we ourselves are warmed and illumined by it, so are we confident that ultimately it will drive away the darkness and illumine the whole universe.

Over 200 Women Attend Testimonial To Four Past Presidents
