SHAVUOTH IN THE SYNAGOGUE

Shavuoth, the Feast of Weeks, commemorates the giving of the Ten Commandments on Mt. Sinai. It is also known as the "Chag Habikkurim," the Festival of First Fruits—a very joyous occasion in ancient as well as in modern Palestine.

Our synagogue as usual will be fittingly decorated with flowers and greens in honor of the holiday. We expect a large attendance on both days — Sunday and Monday — to share with us the joy and beauty of the festival.

On Saturday night at 10 o'clock the custom of saying "Tikkun" will be observed in the chapel. There will, of course, be the usual smokes and

holiday refreshments. All men are cordially invited.

On Sunday morning, the first day of Shavuoth, the scriptural reading will include the Ten Commandments. This will be preceded by the chanting of "Akdomos" by the rabbi and the congregation.

On Monday, the second day of Shavuoth, the Book of Ruth will be read and Yizkor memorial services recited.

Shavuoth is the last major festival of the year. As the Festival of Torah, it bids us to re-dedicate ourselves to the teachings and traditions of our faith. By our presence in the synagogue on the holiday, we re-affirm our loyalty to the Torah.

SISTERHOOD HOLDS FINAL MEETING OF YEAR TRIBUTE PAID TO OUTGOING OFFICERS

Mrs. Alexander Kommel, New President

The Sisterhood crowned one of the most successful seasons in its sixteen years of existence with its final meeting of the year on Tuesday, May 19th. Mrs. Louis W. Yohann, hostess of the afternoon, provided an atmosphere of festivity and elegance that was most appropriate to the occasion. With Mrs. Harry Etra presiding, reports were read on the activities of the year. Mrs. Seppy I. Silberman in her financial statement showed that the Sisterhood, which had disbursed \$4070.00 to various deserving agencies and individuals, closed its books for the year with a goodly surplus. Further, Mrs. Alexander Kommel, in charge of the Federation and UJA drives advised that the group had donated more than \$3475.00 and \$6400.00 respectively to these two causes.

The achievements of the Sisterhood, however, during 1946 were by no means confined to philanthropic work. Mrs. Robert Wallach of the Program Committee read a detailed report outlining the activities of the year which were of both a cultural and informational nature. These included reviews of books of Jewish interest, reports on Europe and musical programs. The climax of all the activities was, of course, the annual donor luncheon in honor of the past presidents, an event that furnished a fine example to women's organizations throughout the city. Mrs. Jacob Rudd reported on the S.O.S. drive with an especial word of praise for Mrs. Edgar Trautman who had devoted herself wholeheartedly to this project.

The efforts of the year were indeed fruitful and the success of these efforts was reflected in the growth of the Sisterhood membership. Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein, reporting in the absence of Mrs. Jacob H. Alpert, Chairman of the Membership Committee, pointed out that including the

seventeen women inducted this season the Sisterhood roster now shows 135 members.

Finally, the main order of business was arrived at and the chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the following slate which was unanimously elected to office: Mrs. Alexander Kommel, President; Mrs. Seppy I. Silberman, Vice President; Mrs. David Joseph, Treasurer; Mrs. Robert Wallach, Recording Secretary; and Mrs. Bernard D. Fischman, Corresponding Secretary.

The most moving moment of the afternoon was then provided by Mrs. Harry Etra, the outgoing President. In a brief review of her three years of administration she spoke of the bonds of sentiment that had been forged between her and her fellow members — bonds that made the Sisterhood not merely an organizational group but a family association with all the ties of devotion, concern, and tenderness which such a term implies. The membership of the Sisterhood then presented Mrs. Etra with a gift as a tangible token of the feelings with which they regarded their outgoing executive and of their high evaluation of the gracious, intelligent and ever-courteous guidance which they had enjoyed at her hands. Those present were visibly affected and turned to Rabbi Lookstein, their guest, to close the meeting with a few words.

The Rabbi paid tribute to all the officers and members of the Sisterhood, past and present, who were instrumental in developing the organization from a small nucleus of enthusiastic women to the fine capable group that it is today, influential in the synagogue and in the community at large. The Sisterhood which has grown through the years in experience, in wisdom and in service can look forward with assurance to the future. The organization under
