RABBI LOOKSTEIN RETURNS FROM SURVEY OF CONDITION OF EUROPEAN JEWRY

TO ADDRESS MEN'S CLUB SEPTEMBER 9th

In its first meeting of the year, the Men's Club is honored to act as hosts to the Congregation. The Sisterhood. and the entire Kehilath Jeshurun family in welcoming Rabbi Lookstein upon his return from Europe. At this meeting, arranged for Tuesday, September 9th at 8:15 p.m., the Men's Club expects a capacity crowd in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House to give a rousing welcome to the Rabbi who is returning with Mrs. Lookstein from a brief but exciting visit to the Continent. Speaking on the subject "The Fate of Europe and its Jews-an Eyewitness Report." the Rabbi will bring to his audience a first hand account of his experiences during a short trip replete with touching and thrilling moments.

The Rabbi's prime motive in making this trip was to attend a special consultative conference of the General Mizrachi movement, called for August 15th in Zurich, Switzerland. The purpose of this conference was twofold: first, the formulation of proposals for the reconstitution of the present structure of the Mizrachi movement; secondly, deliberation upon methods of strengthening Mizrachi throughout Europe. Rabbi Lookstein, as a member of the national Administrative Board of the American Mizrachi, was one of the American delegates to the conference,

which was also attended by representatives of the movement in England, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, Palestine and Jewish DP camps in the United States zones of Germany and Austria.

As an auxiliary mission abroad, the Rabbi volunteered to serve as representative of the Joint Distribution Committee in surveying European institutions supported by JDC funds. With particular emphasis on child-care centers, Rabbi Lookstein visited most of the eighty-five institutions in his whirlwind tour that carried him through three European capitals and hundreds of smaller cities and towns.

During the course of his itinerary, the Rabbi had occasion to talk in personal interview with Jan Masaryk, Foreign Minister of Czechoslovakia; leaders of the Haganah and the Jewish Agency, including Moshe Sneh; and outstanding personalities in Jewish diplomatic and national circles. In Carlsbad the Rabbi was accorded

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL REGISTRATION IN PROGRESS

Classes begin Sept. 8th

Our afternoon Religious School, which has earned for itself an enviable reputation in Jewish educational circles, is now in the process of registering new children for the school year 1947-48. Under the guidance of its new principal, Jerome H. Rosenblum, the Religious School looks forward to a year of further achievement in the direction of giving the young boys and girls of our community a thorough Jewish education.

Under the recently instituted program of the School, we are able to provide for the educational needs of children from Kindergarten level through the high school. In small, homogeneous classes, our pupils are afforded individual attention at the hands of a highly qualified welltrained staff of teachers.

Our program of studies includes Prayers, Bible, Language, History, Laws and Customs, and impart an appreciation of Jewish values and Jewish living. A unique feature of our Religious School is our Club program for our pupils. Serving to supplement classroom work; as a medium for the self-expression of the children; and as a source of meaningful enjoyment, the club program offers a wide variety of activities for the children to choose from. This past year the Religious School sponsored Arts and Crafts, Dramatics, Dancing, Newspaper, Puppets, Current Events and Yiddish Clubs, and the outlook for

the future indicates the addition of a number of new groups. Other extracurricular activities include the Junior Congregation at which the children of the Religious School conduct their own services under the guidance of a trained supervisor; dramatic presentations and assemblies; and trips to points of Jewish interest.

• Realizing the importance of beginning a child's Hebrew education at the same time as he starts his secular training, we formed a Kindergarten class during the past year, with facilities for children between the ages of 4½ and 6. Under the watchful and loving eye of a trained Kindergartner, these tots attend once weekly —on Sundays from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.—and participate in all Kindergarten activities of Jewish content.

Throughout, classes are conducted in a modern manner, and the progressive methods and techniques used in language teaching are employed. Classes meet twice each week from 4 to 6 and on Sundays from 9:30 to 12:30. Sessions for the new school year will start Monday, September 8th.

Registration is now in progress and will continue throughout the month. We urge parents to enroll their children early so that classes may start on time. The principal will be glad to confer with parents regarding the Hebrew education of their children and assist in planning an adequate program of studies for them.
