RAMAZ EMBARKS ON SECOND DECADE

School Opens Next Week With Record Enrollment

Ramaz School will enter its eleventh year with the beginning of sessions on Wednesday, September 10th. In the High School, classes will start two days earlier—on Monday, September 8th. During the forthcoming academic year, Ramaz School will have eight grades, including several parallel classes, in the Elementary School. In the High School, which was established three years ago, there will be three classes. The total enrollment of over three hundred — the largest in the history of the school—would have reached a still higher figure had it not been necessary, on account of space limitations, to deny admission to over one hundred applicants.

In the memories of those of us who were associated with Kehilath Jeshurun ten years ago, the founding of Ramaz must still be fresh. From a school with a handful of children, Ramaz has grown into a great institution. From a little-known educational experiment, Ramaz has developed into an institution of international reputation. The excellent general education that it offers to Jewish boys and girls, its extensive religious curriculum, and its underlying objective of integrating Americanism and Judaism, have all combined to stamp it as a challenging venture in the field of both general and Jewish education.

Not only has Ramaz long since fulfilled and justified the vision of its founder, Rabbi Lookstein, it has also met the exacting requirements of the State educational authorities. The school is chartered by the Board of Regents of the State of New York. Last spring educators from the City and State had occasion to visit Ramaz and observe its program of studies. They all praised the school for its program and the way it is carried out.
