MANSION ON EAST 82ND STREET TO ACCOMMODATE HIGH SCHOOL PARENTS COUNCIL LAUNCHES \$250,000 CAMPAIGN

The Ramaz School, founded and sponsored by our congregation, came into the possession last week of a private mansion located at 22 East 82nd Street between Fifth and Madison Avenues. The building is a six-story fireproof structure equipped with an elevator and is exceptionally suited for conversion to school purposes.

Located on one of the finest residential blocks immediately adjacent to Central Park and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the building offers excellent opportunities for the expanding educational activities of Ramaz. The intentions are to accommodate in the building the Junior and Senior High School Departments of the school.

For a long time now, the growth of the institution has made necessary the acquisition of additional space. Close to one-hundred-and-fifty applicants had to be turned away this year for lack of space. There is at the present time a long waiting list of students seeking admission in September 1948. It is expected that with the acquisition of the new building this situation will be greatly relieved.

Plans are now in progress to transfer the Secondary Department of the school to the new building beginning with the Spring Term in February. Arrangements have been made to provide there a new and well-equipped library as well as science laboratories, arts and crafts rooms, and a domestic science room. When these installations are completed, Ramaz will have one of the finest and best equipped High School buildings in the city.

The Parents Council of the school received the news enthusiastically and launched a campaign for \$250,000 to provide funds for the purchase of the building and the necessary alterations that have to be made in it. The proceeds of this fund will also be used for the installation of an elevator in the present school building and for other required improvements there. A goodly sum has already been pledged and a committee of the Parents Council, headed by Mr. Max Sadinoff, is busily engaged in raising the balance.

The Ramaz School has proved itself the fastest growing educational institution of its kind. Organized in 1937, it opened with only six students and now has an enrollment of over three hundred. It has won the commendation of the State Department of Education and of educational leaders all over the country. It served as a model school for the Jewish Education Committee of New York and is being used by the Senior students of the Teachers Institute of Yeshiva University to observe educational techniques and to do their practice teaching. Last May the State Department of Education listed the school as one of the points of interest to be observed by supervisors and principals

of general education from all over the state who attended a supervisors conference in New York City. The school has been written up in several educational journals and is being used as a model for similar schools that are being founded all over the country. The educational consultants of the school are Professor Joseph G. Cohen of Brooklyn College, and Professors Pinkhos Churgin and Jacob I. Hartstein of Yeshiva University.

The Ramaz School has indeed reached a most significant milestone. Deserving of congratulations are the Principal, supervisory and teaching staffs of the school, and, of course, the enthusiastic devoted parents body. Our congregation which founded and sponsored the institution has reason to feel proud and joyful of this great achievement.
