A Happy Chanukah To All



THIS IS AN IMPORTANT SABBATH

Besides the importance each Saturday has in and of itself, this coming Saturday takes on added significance in three distinct ways, for Kehilath Jeshurun worshipers. We believe that our congregants should repeat, and even surpass, the attendance at services which we had last week, for the occasion warrants an overflow crowd, just as last week's service, at which we commemorated the establishment of the Jewish State, merited the response it received.

This Saturday is Shabbat Chanukah. The festival of Chanukah has always been an occasion for joy and gleeful celebration. This year, in particular, we should celebrate this festival of dedication in a manner which befits constituents of a re-born nation, in dedicating ourselves to our people and to the service of God.

This Saturday, too, is Shabbat Rosh Chodesh. On this day we will usher in the new month of Tebet, and pray to the Almighty for a month of goodness, health and blessedness. The coincidence of Rosh Chodesh and the Sabbath has always had an added meaning to our people; this year its impact is no less felt.

Of final significance, this Saturday will mark the occasion for the second in the four-lecture series on "Previewinging the Jewish State", which was instituted by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein last week. Our friends will recall that a most important set of lectures—important from the viewpoints of timeliness, information and clarification—was inaugurated on the establishment of the Jewish State. Last Saturday, in the first of his lectures, Rabbi Lookstein gave his

FESTIVE WEEK-END AT K. J.

RABBI LOOKSTEIN SPEAKS AT SPECIAL SERVICE

Last Saturday, December 6th, Rabbi Lookstein inaugurated the first of his four lectures on "Previewing the Jewish State". Before a crowded auditorium of over 300 congregants, Rabbi Lookstein spoke on "The Jewish D-Day, Its Implications for us and for the World." In a voice filled with an emotion that found a sympathetic echo in the hearts of his listeners, Rabbi Lookstein repeated the famed words of Theodore Herzl after the first Zionist convention: "Today I have founded the Jewish State. If I said this aloud the answer would be universal laughter . . . In any case in fifty years everyone will recognize this.

Indeed, said Rabbi Lookstein, prophecy has not departed from our people. In fifty years, from Basle in 1897 to Flushing Meadows in 1947, the Jewish State was established. Yet, the question presents itself, how did this event, unique in human history, occur? How, after eighteen hundred

and seventy-seven years of exile, of landless lamentation, in fifty years did the miracle come to pass? Was it due to Herzl-that towering figure of Judaism? To Moses Hess? To Leon Pinsker? To Nordau? To Ussishkin? None of them, said Rabbi Lookstein, would claim the credit; none of them would arrogate the glory. It was due rather to eighteen hundred and seventy-seven fasts of Tisha B'Ab's; to eighteen hundred and seventy-seven fasts of Tebeth's: to the fact that never once did the nation fail to remember. When the Jew married, the crushed glass recalled his destroyed Temple; when he was buried the soil of Eretz Israel sealed his covenant to remember for all eternity.

Upon the conclusion of Rabbi Lookstein's address, the entire congregation sat in a breathless silence more moving and more heartfelt than any words. The congregants then joined the rabbi in a supplementary service of Thanksgiving. Responsively and reverently a portion of the Hallel was read and the words of the Lord from Isaiah repeated, "In an acceptable time have I answered you and on a day of salvation have I helped you." Cantor Gertler then sang the Palestinian song, Yerushalayim, expressing the love and longing of the Jew throughout the centuries for his homeland. We know that the whole congregation that joined enthusiastically in the final singing of the Hatikvah will not forget this memorable Sabbath so fittingly celebrated in our congregation.
