To Mr. and Mrs. Gedeon Heller go our best wishes for a happy anniversary, and our hope that they have many more joyous years together.


Honors-

CHURCH AND STATE NO ISSUE FOR JEWISH PALESTINE, SAYS RABBI

In his sermon last Saturday, which again was delivered before a capacity congregation, Rabbi Lookstein discussed the problem of "Religion and the Jewish State." It was the third in a series of four lectures on the general theme, "Previewing the Jewish State." The last in the series entitled, "The Jewish State and Jewry outside of Palestine," will be delivered this Saturday.

The entire concept of church and state, said the rabbi, is alien to the Jewish people. It is a concept imposed upon us in the diaspora. It is indigenous to the Christian state—not the Jewish one.

In ancient Palestine, there were times when the Jewish government was greatly influenced by the religion of Israel. At other times that influence was weak and not infrequently rejected. During the First Jewish Commonwealth there were pious kings and kings who were idolaters. During the Second Commonwealth, there were periods when Pharisaic influence was strong in the government, and other periods when Sadducean influence was strong. To associate the very notion of church and state with ancient Palestine is to resort to an anachronism.

"To be sure, the Jewish religion will be revitalized in our state," said the Rabbi. "For almost two thousand years we waited to observe the Sabbath, to keep the Holidays, to celebrate the festivals as free people. In diaspora the observance of these occasions required exertion, effort, determination. In our own land we will practice our religion almost involuntarily. In the Jewish state violation and non-observance will require effort."

There will undoubtedly be those who will not observe Jewish rituals, continued the rabbi. Our task will be to persuade them through all the methods that are available to modern

teachers of religion, but we dare not contemplate the infliction of penalties or other restrictions in the realm of personal religion. We have too long been the victims of religious persecution to become the inflictors of it upon others.

"The phenomenon that we anticipate most eagerly is the resurrection of the Jewish Law," said the Rabbi. "Folios of the Talmud and vast sections of the Jewish Codes have for almost two thousand years been merely academic disciplines and no more. Now they will become living and dynamic forces. For centuries they have been the occupation of scholars and students. Now they will become the concern of every citizen of the Jewish state, the regulators of his conduct, the safeguard of his liberty. 'The law of the land' which once meant subjection to Roman Law or to the English Common Law will now assume a new connotation. The law of the Jewish land will be the Torgh.
