RELIGIOUS LIFE WILL BENEFIT FROM JEWISH STATE, SAYS RABBI

Last Saturday, Rabbi Lookstein delivered the final talk in his series of four sermons on "Previewing the Jewish State." Speaking before a crowded congregation who braved the rigors of the weather, the Rabbi discussed "The Jewish State and Jewry Outside of Palestine."

As an introduction to the problem, Rabbi Lookstein reviewed briefly the relation of the diaspora to Palestine during the long years of exile, considering in turn the various aspects of nationalism — Galut nationalism, Messianic nationalism and Zionism as well as the theories which consider Judaism as a religious persuasion.

Now, the Rabbi said, the time has come for a radical reorientation on the part of the Jew. The Jewish state is no longer a theory, a projected dream, but a reality. This reality like all great historic events brings with it, especially in this instance, for the Jew outside of Palestine, certain doubts and uncertainties. The Palestinian Jew will of course be Jewish nationally as well as spiritually. The Jew outside of the Jewish state, however, will remain unequivocally a citizen of the country in which he resides. Politically, he will be an American or a Frenchman. What, then, will be his relation to Judaism? For the religious Jew, it will be simple. The one-eighth of Palestine granted

HARRY FISCHEL OF BLESSED MEMORY

Together with all Israel, Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun mourns the passing of Harry Fischel, dear husband of Miriam Fischel and beloved father of our esteemed members, Mrs. David Kass and Mrs. Henry A. Rafsky.

Harry Fischel breathed his last in the Holy Land which he loved so dearly and which he enriched by his many philanthropies and in which he established a most precious institution, The Harry Fischel Institute for Talmudic Research.

But it was in America that he attained his greatest triumphs and to which he contributed his rich qualities of heart and mind. He was a master-builder of the Jewish community in this land. Hospitals, homes for the aged, religious schools were some of the institutions that he helped build. The needy here and the oppressed overseas were the beneficiaries of his labors and benefactions.

His greatest love was Torah and for its perpetuation he labored most faithfully. The Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, the Yeshiva College, and latterly, the Yeshiva University were his favorites. For them he reserved his utmost devotion and to them he gave to the fullest measure of his generosity. Before departing for Palestine he established as part of the Yeshiva University the Harry Fischel Institute for Jewish Studies and endowed it in perpetuity.


Engagement-

by the United Nations does not represent for him the fulfillment of his Messianic hopes. He is still awaiting the final coming of the Messiah, whatever form he may take, and with it final redemption. But what course will be left to the "secular" Jew? Logically, said the Rabbi, there are but two alternatives: either he will disappear, a vestigal relic without function or direction; or he will turn more and more to observance.

The Jew, while an American or a Frenchman or an Italian politically, however, will and must indeed retain his ties with his people, and the chief of these ties is his religion. Here the Jew is as unique as his history has been unique. The Irish American is by religion a Catholic; the Swedish American a Lutheran. But the American Jew has for his religion Judaism. His people and his faith are identical, and it is through his faith that he will come closer to his people.

It is obvious that these four lectures given by the Rabbi have had an inspiring affect on all who have followed them. After the Mincha service last Saturday, a Forum-Tea was held and the energetic response and enthusiastic attendance at that function indicated that our people have been thinking and thinking seriously upon the recent historic events. Certainly the creative challenge of our Rabbi met an equally creative response from his congregants, and this in itself is indicative of the vitality and intelligence of our congregational family.
