JEWRY (NOT JURY) DUTY

Kehilath Jeshurun has pioneered in many phases of Jewish life. Its most recent pioneering effort can be characterized as extremely unique.

It all happened as follows. A group of Kehilath Jeshurunites met at the Rabbi's home last Monday night and discussed the weekday morning services at the synagogue. It was brought to the attention of the gathering that the institution of daily services, so basic to religious Judaism, was slowly losing ground in the American Jewish community. In many synagogues attendance at these services was decreasing rapidly. In most cases the worshipers at . the services were the old folks. Younger people used the daily service merely on occasions of mourning and Yahrzeit. Some synagogues have actually had to engage "professional" worshipers in order to maintain the daily service.

The group at the rabbi's home decided to do something about this. The discussion took the following line. There was an established institution in American life known as Jury Duty. A citizen was expected at certain times to appear and to serve as a juror. Only extenuating circumstances can exempt him from that service.

Well, argued those at the meeting, why can we not institute a similar practice in Jewish congregational life.

THEME OF SUPPER LECTURE SERIES

Rabbi Lookstein To Be Speaker

On Sunday, March 7th, we will begin the 1948 Supper Lecture Series. This project, under the sponsorship of the Men's Club of the congregation, was an outstanding success last year when it was first initiated. Some four hundred people attended the series of four supper lectures in 1947, and even at that time it was felt that it would become an established educational institution in

the congregation.

TWIXTEENERS GROUP ORGANIZED

Large Audience Hears Yehuda Hellman—

Youthful, dynamic Yehuda Hellman held his audience spellbound Tuesday evening with his short talk on "What Next in Palestine?" at the Forum Meeting sponsored by the Men's Club. For an all-too-short period of time, Mr. Hellman pictured for his audience—one of the largest to attend a Men's Club gathering—the nature of the intrigue and warfare current in the Middle East.

An astute observer of conditions in that explosive area, Mr. Hellman gave us his analysis of the roles being played by the Arabs, with the Mufti as the leading figure, the British, the Soviet Union, the United States, and the Haganah fighting in defense of its right to statehood and status as a nation among equals. To all intents and purposes, actual war has been declared between the Jews and the Arabs. Not to be underestimated, the Arabs have the support of the British as well as of the United States through its official attitude, the embargo it placed on the shipment of arms to the Jews, and the character of its ambassadors and other officers in the Middle East. However, the Haganah is prepared to fight a war to the bitter end, the lack of equipment notwithstanding.

Mr. Hellman emphasized the importance of our backing the Haganah. In truth, he said that "we are on the banks of the Jordan." The fight in Palestine is the fight of every Jew, no matter where he makes his home now.

That the guest speaker was received most warmly was evidenced by the questions that followed his talk. All present agreed that this was one of the outstanding Forum Meetings of the season.

Plan for Annual Purim Party—

At the last Executive Board meeting of the Men's Club, plans were discussed for the Annual Purim Party. Sponsored jointly with the Sisterhood, the affair has been set for Sunday, March 28th. Details are now being arranged by a joint committee of the two organizations, and will be announced shortly. We advise you to mark the date off—March 28th—and make plans to be with us. Let every member of a congregation consider it his moral duty to serve the cause of religious Jewry by preserving the institution of the daily "Minyon." Let him volunteer to appear a certain number of days during the year at the daily morning service, derive whatever satisfaction he can out of it for himself, help maintain it for others, and contribute to its perpetuation for all Israel.

Acting upon that theory those present at the Rabbi's home volunteered to attend the daily service two weeks during the year. It was decided to conduct an experiment for the months of March and April. These months were divided into two week periods, from March 1st through March 1sth; from March 16th through March 31st; from April 1st through April 15th; from April 16th through April 30th. If the experiment works for these two months it is planned to extend this practice to other members who may care to volunteer.
