

RABBI LOOKSTEIN TO DE-LIVER RADIO ADDRESSES ON MESSAGE OF ISRAEL

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein has accepted the invitation to be the guest speaker on the American Broadcasting Company's Message of Israel for the five Sundays in May.

Now in its fifteenth year of uninterrupted weekly broadcasting over this network, the Message of Israel is heard each Sunday from 10 to 10:30 a.m. on more than 150 stations in the United States and Canada, as well as by short-wave abroad.

The subjects of the Rabbi's talks are: May 2, "The Old Tradition in a New Light"; May 9, "A Religious Definition of Man"; May 16, "A Religious Evaluation of Wealth"; May 23, "A Religious Analysis of Time"; and May 30, "A Religious Appraisal of Freedom."

We are certain our readers will welcome this news and will listen to our Rabbi, Sunday mornings at 10 over WJZ.

Mr. Horowitz has traveled extensively in Palestine and is the author of a number of books now in use in schools.

We are certain that his talk, which will be given at the Twixteeners' meeting of Sunday, May 16th, will be both informative and interesting, and that a large number of members and their friends will be at hand to hear it.
