REMEMBER THE BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE

"For that I now solemnly offer charity in their memory."

With these words, Jews the world over recite the Yizkor prayer on four occasions during the year. In this manner, synagogue worshipers whose relatives have departed from this earth, pray that their memories be blessed and perpetuated.

It is a solemn pronouncement made during one of the most solemn services in Jewish liturgy. It is a promise made by the worshiper, in return for which he expects his request to be fulfilled.

Four years ago, Kehilath Jeshurun instituted the Book of Remembrance, published annually at Shevuos time. The purpose of this Book was to provide the opportunity to our worshipers and friends to fulfill the pledge taken on the four occasions when Yizkor is recited, and to do it in dignity and reverence.

The Book of Remembrance was not conceived as a fund-raising venture. Free of every aspect of commercialism, it is consistent with the Yizkor prayer in which a pronouncement of a pledge for charity is made. In order to stress the purely religious character of the offering, it was decided that it be no less than five dollars nor more than ten. Thus, the offering is purged of any material tinge and represents purely a token of reverence for the departed.

Last week, the Synagogue office mailed to its members and friends a printed card, to be returned to the office with the name of the deceased to be included in the Book of Remembrance. Already a large response has been received. Strangely, however, many of the cards that have been returned to us have come from friends who did not participate in the Book last year. If we were to publish the Book of Remembrance today, many names that were in-

BUILDING ALTERATION ENTERS LAST PHASE

Completion Expected About Sept. 1st


The accompanying picture in this Bulletin shows a web of scaffolding constructed over the entire interior of the Main Synagogue. This, of course, is an indication that the last phase of our alteration project has begun. This last phase will concern itself with improvements in the Main Synagogue.

Let us take you behind the scaffolding and tell you in advance what the architect's plans call for. To begin with, a special plenum chamber will be built on the roof of the synagogue and will be supplied with powerful exhaust fans. A network of ducts, concealed within the syna-

gogue structure itself, will be provided. All this will form part of the new ventilating system and will assure our worshipers of a well-regulated flow of clean filtered fresh air at all times while services are in progress.

New rubber tiled flooring is called for on the main floor as well as in the Ladies' Balcony. The balustrade around the balcony will be remodeled to improve the line of vision so that our lady worshipers will at all times have a full view of everything that transpires in the synagogue.

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SISTERHOOD CLOSES SEASON OF ACTIVITY WITH MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Monday afternoon, the Hotel Pierre was the scene of the Closing Membership Meeting of the Sisterhood. O. S., the Happy Day Fund, and the generous assistance rendered in providing four scholarships to Ramaz School.

In a word, said Mrs. Kommel, "with an ever increasing membership, we are about to conclude a year of unprecedented activity."

Treasurer Renders Financial Report —

The gathering then heard Mrs. David Joseph, Treasurer of the Sisterhood, deliver a most interesting financial report. The membership was happy to learn that in spite of the increased program of activity, and notwithstanding the numerous gifts presented to worthy causes, the Sisterhood financial situation was still unquestionably sound.

Committee Chairmen Report on Activities —

Mrs. Kommel then introduced the chairmen of the different committees, who reported in greater detail on the achievements of the past year. Mrs. Abraham Wiener, chairman of the Program Committee, reviewed the

series of open meetings which were conducted by the Sisterhood and at which some of the most outstanding and interesting speakers were heard.

The chairman of the Neediest Cases Committee, Mrs. Seppy I. Silberman, gave a beautiful report on the accomplishments of the committee working on the most recent addition to the Sisterhood program of activity. She outlined several of the cases which came to the attention of the committee, and reported on the assistance which was rendered in each case. (Ed. note: We are happy to inform you that through the kindness of Mrs. Israel Cummings and Mrs. Harry Etra, two radios were provided for the Edenwald School for Boys, whose request came to the Neediest Cases Committee. Similarly, a Bulletin reader responded to the request of a war veteran by offering her baby carriage. To all, many

The final report of the afternoon was rendered by Mrs. Edgar Trautman, who reported on the S.O.S. project. A number of members cooperated beautifully, and a large quantity of knitted goods was sent to Europe, to clothe the desperate remnant of our people still there.

MEN'S CLUB DINNER ENJOYED BY LARGE ASSEMBLAGE

With the auditorium of the Synagogue House transformed into a banquet hall, the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club brought its social season to a climactic close at its 8th Annual Dinner. The hall, gaily decorated with banquet tables bedecked with colorful dishes, candles, and ferns, was filled to near-capacity with Men's Club members and well-wishers who came to participate in an evening of sociability. Add to that scene a large assortment of portraits, done in oil by the celebrated artist, David Immerman, and you have a setting of unusual gaiety and color in keeping with the spirit of the affair.

The festivities began with the guests gathering in the gynasium for cocktails and hors d'oeuvres in an atmosphere of good fellowship and cheer. After a short time, the guests ascended to the auditorium, where, following the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner" led by Cantor Hyman Gertler and the invocation pronounced by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, they partook of a full course catered banquet dinner par excellence. Then, with after-dinner cigars burning, the assemblage settled down to more serious matters, as Ira F. Weisman, President of the Men's Club, took the floor to make a number of important presentations.

He first presented several checks constituting Men's Club contributions, to the Camp Fund, the Scholarship Funds of Ramaz and the Religious School, and to the Congregation Building Fund. In each case, the amount was considerable, and gave evidence of the generosity and genuine interest of Men's Club members.

The second presentation was that of the guest speaker of the evening, Dr. David W. Petegorsky, Executive Director of the American Jewish Congress. Dr. Petegorsky, speaking on "The Jewish State in World Politics," delivered an inspiring address on the most momentous event of our day—the establishment of Israel—and its implications the world over, particularly among American Jewry. "Of one thing we may be certain;" said Dr. Petegorsky, "the Jewish State is supremely prepared to discharge the

moral obligations of Statehood. The persecution and hardship endured by our people, render us prepared for such purpose." It is, paradoxical, that "in return for the Torquemadas, the Hitlers and the Hamans we will give the world justice an morality." On the other hand, continued the speaker, perhaps our compensation for having endured suffering will be the privilege of performing such a mission.

Dr. Petegorsky cautioned against two possible eventualities arising from the establishment of Israel two challenges which American Jews in particular will have to face. The first is indifference and complacency on the part of Jews. Now that a Jewish State is a reality, we can "settle down and relax." The second danger, of equal or greater imminence, is the tendency on the part of some Jews to "bend over backwards" in an effort to disassociate themselves from the Jewish State. Any positive identification with the State, they contend, would be "subversive."

To meet these challenges, said the speaker in concluding his remarks, "if we assimilate that militancy, that sense of responsibility and determination, that Jewish dignity as the Yishuv in Israel did, then, no matter how unpopular and threatened our
