1948 YEAR BOOK LAUNCHED

Elliott W. Siegel Again Named Chairman

The campaign for the 1948 Year Book was inaugurated last week, with the announcement by Max J. Etra, President of the Congregation, of the appointment of Elliott W. Siegel to again head the Year Book Committee. Named as Vicechairmen of the committee were Alexander Gross, Martin Klein and Louis W. Yohann.

THE RABBI'S SERMON THIS SABBATH MORNING

The sermon this Saturday will be on "How and By Whom can Jewish Law be Changed." As an Orthodox rabbi of an Orthodox congregation, Rabbi Lookstein has taken a very definite position on this subject which is fundamental to our tenets. In a day which has seen the tragic results of moral relativism, of compromise with evil, it is more important than ever that the Jew revitalize his ancient Law both for himself and for a world which must achieve ethical equilibrium or perish. In his sermon the rabbi will discuss the fallacies inherent in the Conservative view on the amendment of the Law. He will analyze proper change of the Law. if and under what conditions it may be valid.

The sermon is a "must" for every one of our congregational family. We know that a treat is in store for the rabbi's audience and that his views will provide a rare stimulus for thought, for discussion and for action.

Do not fail to be with us this Sabbath.

The appointment of these members to guide this most important project, augurs well for its success. They have been active in K. J. affairs for a number of years, and have proven their ability as champion ad-getters beyond the slightest doubt. With these men at the head, the 1948 Year Book cannot help but be a successful venture.

The Year Book has become an institution with us. It is a highly anticipated publication that has earned the highest commendations from its readers-members and non-members alike. As an outstanding literary volume, as a valuable documentary record of Kehilath Jeshurun activities, and as a beautiful esthetic product, the 1948 Year Book will maintain-if not surpass-the standards set by Year Books of previous years.

From the material point of view, results from past Year Books have been most gratifying. This year, a quota somewhat higher than before has been set. The committee, however, knows that with but a little effort on the part of our members, that quota can easily be reached. 

With the largest attendance of the season present in the Auditorium, the platform at the Men's Club Third Forum meeting was graced with the presence of Dr. Nathan Reich, who spoke on "The Economic Outlook for American Jewry." And well satisfied were our guests at the conclusion of Dr. Reich's talk, for they had really enjoyed an interesting and intelligent analysis of what faces the American Jew in his quest for a livelihood and financial security.

The speaker pointed out that while the Jewish population will, in general,

be affected in the same way as the general populace, there are certain factors which will affect them differently. The type of industry in which Jews indulge; the geographic settlement of our people in America; and their psychological outlook on small enterprise as compared to big business-all will tend to create certain economic conditions for which they must be prepared. Anti-Semitism and racial discrimination will not be major hindrances, would the Jewish people here make adjustments to conditions which, statistics prove, are headed in certain directions.
