



FATHER AND SON MINYAN AND BREAKFAST REORGANIZED

The Father and Son Minyan and Breakfast will resume its weekly get-togethers this Sunday, January 30th, at 9:00 a.m. in the Chapel. It is expected that a large number of boys will be on hand to welcome back this important activity.

It was two years ago that this project first saw light. As a means of fostering closer companionship between fathers and sons in religious as well as cultural or social functions, the Minyan was instituted in November, 1946, and met with instantaneous favorable response. Sponsorship of the group was undertaken by the Men's Club, which has come to consider the Minyan an important phase of its varied program.

The Minyan soon blossomed into one of the most successful activities of the synagogue, filling as it did a deeply felt need. Then, with the beginning of the alterations to the synagogue building and the limitations which the structural work necessarily placed upon all congregation functions, the Minyan was suspended for almost a year. During that time, countless requests were received for the re-institution of this Sunday morning feature, but this could not be effected until the necessary facilities were made available to us once more.

The Men's Club therefore happily announces that all arrangements have been completed for the Minyan and Breakfast to resume meeting this Sunday. The Chairman of the project is Mr. Alex Garfein, who has nurtured the activity since its inception. Attendance is open to all post-Bar Mitzvah boys, regardless of whether they are affiliated with the congrega-

ADULT INSTITUTE TO RE-OPEN TUESDAY

Comprehensive Program of Studies Being Prepared

Mr. Myer B. Appleman has announced that classes in the Adult Institute will be resumed this Tuesday evening, February 1, with two groups meeting. This is the initial step to the establishment of the Institute on a firm foundation, with courses to be offered in numerous fields of Jewish study.

The announcement followed weeks of planning for the re-opening of the Institute which had to curtail its activities for several reasons after the close of its term in June. The re-organization of the classes has been a subject of major concern to the administration of the synagogue and the commencement of sessions this Tuesday evening marks a step in the right direction.

The classes which will begin this week are both in the Hebrew language: one in elementary Hebrew, the other in Intermediate Hebrew. The object of both is to present the Hebrew language as a living tongue, a dynamic force among the languages of today. The stress will be on conversational Hebrew, on the language that is read, spoken and used daily by the citizens of Israel as their means of intercommunication. Naturally, to give it added meaning to the American Jew, the study of Hebrew in these classes will also be related to the prayer-book.

Other Courses to be Added Soon —

The addition of several other courses will shortly be announced. Among subjects that will be offered are History, Literature, Music, Bible, Customs and Ceremonies — all of which will be presented for the absorption of the modern American Jewish man and woman. The schedule of the entire program of the Adult Institute is now being prepared, and we expect to make our plans known

The meeting, over which Mrs. Benjamin Leifert, the president of the Parents' Club, presided, included several beautifully-rendered piano selections by one of the parents, Mrs. Paul Pakter, known professionally as Miss Selma Mednikoff. Mrs. Leifert also called upon Mr. Myer B. Appleman, the Principal of the Religious School, who spoke about registration in the newly-formed beginners' class, in the Kindergarten and in the Adult Institute. Mrs. Alice Rothkowitz, a member of the Religious School teaching staff, greeted those present in the name of the faculty, and stressed the priceless value of close cooperation between the home and the school.

Speaking as chairman of the Religious School Committee, Mr. Abbott Bernard extended his greetings; as did Mr. Ira F. Weisman, president of our Men's Club, which is actively co-operating with the Parents' group in its activities.

Address Forum Meeting —**

As its guest speaker at the next Forum Meeting, to be held Tuesday evening, February 15th, the Men's Club has invited Professor Sidney Hook, Chairman of the Philosophy Department at New York University. Prof. Hook will talk on "Philosophy and our Daily Bread."

Members of the Men's Club will recall that Prof. Hook addressed a Forum Meeting of the 1945-46 season, at which time he was exceptionally well received. The invitation that has been extended to him for the 15th, is thus by popular demand, as it were.

Born and educated in New York City, Prof. Hook is one of the leading philosophers and educators of this generation. He studied with men like Morris Raphael Cohen, John Dewey and F. J. E. Woodbridge, was twice awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship for research in Philosophy, and, in 1945, received the Nicholas Murray Butler Silver Medal for distinction in the field of philosophy and education.

Prof. Hook practices his philosophy in addition to teaching it. He has been in the forefront of organized effort to preserve and extend the heritage of freedom in our country, and has been mainly responsible for the organization of numerous committees for this purpose. As a teacher, his has been a singularly successful career in academic institutions as well as in the chief centers of adult education. Prof. Hook has been characterized as "one of the most stimulating teachers of our time."

Prof. Hook has written an imposing array of books, among them "The Metaphysics of Pragmatism," "Reason, Social Myths and Democracy," "Education for Modern Man," and numerous others. He is a gifted speaker with a message of great interest to convey. We are certain our members and friends will turn out in large numbers to this outstanding Forum Meeting.
